CAMP IS BETTER OFF

WITHOUT CANTEEN, SAYS CAPT. J. W. JONES.

In Preaching to the Protestant Soldiers at Barrifield on Sunday—Conditions Are Much Improved.

That "no canteen" has proved a long step in the betterment of the conditions of the men at Barrifield camp, this evening is the opinion of Capt. the Rev. Rural Dean Jones of Tamworth, chaplain of the 47th Regiment. This sentiment was expressed by him toward the conclusion of his sermon at the drum-head service, at which the Protestant troops in camp attended on Sunday morning. Major Thompson, chaplain of the 49th Regiment, conducted the service, the band of the 47th leading the singing.

Capt. Jones, from the text, "A good soldier of Jesus Christ" (II Timothy ii, 3), explained the word "soldier," pointing out instances of soldiers of the Old Testament and drew attention to four centuries of the New Testament of splendid types. St. Paul held the military profession in high honor, and down to to-day some of our best nation-builders have been and are soldiers.

The preacher spoke regarding the evident interest the officers have taken in the men, thanking them. The coarser elements of the men who came to camp are being weeded out, the younger officers are of a splendid type, the conditions are being raised through the abolition of the canteen, all tending towards making the militia an uplift to the nation, making good manhood and better soldiers of the king and Jesus Christ.

The Roman Catholics of the units paraded to the divisional headquarters at nine o'clock this morning, where Rev. Father Halligan, pastor of St. Mary's cathedral, said mass, and gave an impressive discourse.

On Saturday evening several of the men in camp took part in the Y.M.C.A. service. Major Thompson, chaplain of the 49th Regiment, led the service Sunday evening. W. J. Blakestone, of Colingwood, arrived Saturday evening, to assist at the "Y."
