WILSON IS NOMINATED SEARCH FOR BODIES

SEVERAL STATES TURN THEIR VOTES TO HIM.

Bryan Boosting Wilson Against Tammany—The New Jersey Governor Looked Like a Winner Tuesday Afternoon.

Baltimore, Md., July 2.—On the 46th ballot Underwood withdrew from the contest.

Woodrow Wilson was elected on this ballot as democratic candidate.

Baltimore, Md., July 2.—Having taken forty-one fruitless ballots in the endeavor to nominate a candidate for president of the United States, the deadlocked democratic national convention early today refused after a partial roll call vote to adjourn and delegates and visitors settled down for an all-night session.

Woodrow Wilson's candidacy was in the ascendancy during yesterday's session. He gained steadily throughout the day. On the thirty-ninth ballot he passed the 500 mark, with 501 1/2 votes, but on the forty-first ballot he dropped back to 499 1/2. Champ Clark lost almost as steadily as Wilson gained. The heat was terrific and most of the delegates worked in shirt sleeves.

At 12.45 o'clock this morning the convention adjourned until noon, today.

There was considerable demonstration at the convention shortly after noon, today, when Illinois and West Virginia broke and turned over the most of their votes from Clark and Underwood to Woodrow Wilson. Indiana and Pennsylvania made their delegations vote solid for the New Jersey governor.

Boss Murphy, and his lieutenants from the New York delegation, got busy and tried to stem the tide in favor of Wilson, who seems to be gaining every minute. The states which split before are now going for Wilson.

OF MISSING IN THE REGINA CATASTROPHE.

Martial Law Prevails—Twenty-seven Bodies Recovered—Twenty Persons are Missing.

Regina, Sask., July 2.—Local militia were marched in from the annual camp, this morning, and are aiding in digging in the ruins for missing persons. So far only twenty-seven bodies have been recovered, but twenty others are missing. Work of excavating among fallen bricks and twisted timbers is painfully slow and extremely dangerous.

There was a spontaneous outpouring of relief from other cities, and trains bearing nurses, doctors and supplies have arrived from Moose Jaw, Winnipeg and Saskatoon. Most of the homeless are quartered in tents, but many have been taken in by friends in parts of the city left untouched.

While Regina is practically under martial law, there has been little looting. The North-West Mounted Police are ruling with an iron hand. One man who was apparently trying to set fire to the ruins, probably with the idea of attracting attention in that direction, and looting in other places, was shot at, trying to escape. He was wounded and captured, and is awaiting trial.

John F. Hartman, an Ontario man here on a trip, described the fearful cyclone as follows:

"The only thing it could be likened to was hell let loose. I was in my room in King's hotel when the darkening clouds shut off daylight. In less than five minutes rain was pouring into my room. You could not see across the street. Bricks and pieces of wood were flying thickly through the air, and frequently hurled through windows, which were broken with the first of the cyclone. We went on the street, found people limping alone and bleeding; parents crying for children
