### ENFORCE THE BY-LAWS.

The city should, without delay, amend its by-laws, and enforce them. ### ACTING WITH IRUDENCE.

The city has had a call from two or three men, experts from the Hydro-Electric commission, whose mission was, apparently, to show the power department here how unreasonable it can be. It accepted the report of Mr. Kelsch, and that has been interpreted as closing the doors against any offer from the Hydro-Electric people. The committee has not made a declaration to that effect; neither has the city council.

Those who represent the people in public affairs, have carried themselves becomingly in this matter. They have received the best offers from the power company and commission, and laid them before one who, by reason of his ability and experience, was regarded as competent to advise them.

Mr. Kelsch took everything into account—the cost of distributing the hydro power, the cost of maintaining a steam plant in any event, the difficulty of installing an electric pumping plant at the water station, etc., and he said that at the prices quoted for power it would not pay to buy it. That was practically all he said, and it was enough. It induced

the power committee to lay aside the offers of power that were made to it, because there was nothing else to do.

Now the council proposes to equip the power department with the machinery and boilers that will enable it to meet all the demands for power that may be made upon it, and the people will be acting the better part to see that it is supplied as soon as possible.

The power company or commission is still at liberty, however, to make offers to the council, and offers which can be acted on. The cost, delivered at the city boundary line, must come down. Indeed, rumour has it that a drop has already occurred, and 1,500 kilo-watts per day of twenty-four hours can be had at 1c per kilo-watt.

In time the company or commission will reach a quotation which can be accepted, and at which the city can make a contract, but in the meantime prudence suggests that the power department take the steps that may be necessary to make its plant efficient and equal to all the demands that are made upon it.

### DAUNTLESS LLOYD-GEORGE.

Lloyd-George is a social and political reformer of the most advanced type. The greatest measure of the time, greatest in its comprehensiveness, its completeness, its complexity, is the National Insurance Act, which was conceived in a spirit of helpfulness and is being enforced with a courageous hand. There is some show of defiance, some attempt to disrespect and disobey the law. But it will not succeed. The opponents are termed by the chancellor of the exchequer, "the new anarchists," whose presumption is that they can divide any subject and do as they like.

"But I am of opinion," said Lloyd-George, addressing a great meeting recently, "that the more people look at it, the better they are liking it. But supposing it is as bad as they say it is, their business is to abolish it, and not to defy it. The Education Acts were compulsory. People did not like them, but what would have happened to this country if they had not been compulsory? We are now fighting a highly-educated community in Germany, not with armaments, but with industry; trained brains, that is what is going to settle it. If you had not had the great Education Acts of 1870 and those which followed, what a plight this country would have been in nowadays.

"Take the great Public Health Act of Lord Beaconsfield. People said, 'Fancy compelling people to have drains. We have done without them in this country from the days of Julius Caesar. The men who won the liberties of England, the men who built up its strength and glory, had none of these things. They were allowed to keep pigs and fowls in the backyard without any acts of parliament.' No

The passion and persistence of the chancellor of the exchequer for reform is remarkable in the face of the opposition he must fight down. The campaign he has conducted in this insurance scheme, or social scheme as it has been called, surpasses anything that has involved the energy of man in recent years; and yet, not at all weary in well doing, he is preparing for the freeing of the land, a scheme of colossal proportions and one he will carry through if any man can.
