THE CITY WILL FIGHT TOWN OF GANANOQUE

FOR THE PAYMENT OF HOTEL TAX—RATE WAS FIXED AT TWENTY-EIGHT MILLS.

Must Obey the Injunction—City Solicitor McIntyre Still Holds That the Creditors are Liable.

City Solicitor McIntyre, who had advised the utilities companies that the city had power to cut off the light from the Frontenac hotel, in view of an old bill of \$107 being unpaid, will advise that the intended action of manager Foiger to cut the light off at once, after the time of the notice on the hotel manager had expired, is void from the beginning. Messrs. Smythe and King, solicitors, on Friday, served a temporary injunction on the city, to restrain it from cutting off the light. This injunction continues till the 26th and was secured in view of the damage that would have been done to the hotel if it was deprived of light.

The city solicitor will take action to collect the amount due, as he holds that the creditors represented by the assignee, for whom Charles E. Phoenix is managing the hotel, are liable for the unpaid bill of W. A. Telfer. The British-American hotel owed a similar amount, but this was paid by John Fisher, the mortgagee, on the demand of the city. The city solicitor is making a first charge on any property in Kingston, but light rates are not. Some time ago, City Solicitor McIntyre considered the advisability of having the legislature pass an act making light rates also a first charge, but he finally decided that it would be unfair to property owners, who could control water rates by charging them in the rent, but would have no chance of figuring out what light might be used by a tenant.

REFUSES TO RELEASE.

Two Berlin Youths From the Penitentiary.

The department of justice has refused to parole the two Berlin lads, George Cooper and George Preuss, who were committed to the penitentiary, for five years in the spring. The lads were brought to their act of stealing tools from the C.P.R., by the reading of cheap literature. Cooper was only a few days over sixteen years of age when he was committed to the prison, and his companion, seventeen years. J. C. McOnachie, the children's aid agent, worked for their release, but with no avail. The penitentiary is no place for these youths.

PARLIAMENT HOUSE SITE.

Once Owned Property Afterwards Sold to Government.

Smith's Falls, Ont., July 20.—The death occurred at Lombardy, Leeds county, yesterday, of W. R. Newman, an old settler of that locality. The deceased was a native of England, but on the death of his father came to Ottawa, then called Bytown, to live. The land on which the parliament buildings stand was once his property and was sold for the small sum of 600 pounds sterling. About forty-five years ago, Mr. Newman removed to Lombardy, where he carried on a boot and shoe shop until a year ago. Deceased was eighty-nine years of age. He is survived by two sons and two daughters. His wife died a year and a half ago.
