Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Re-membered.

John Sheridan, real estate broker, committed suicide in Toronto. A serious riot occurred at the anti-suffragette demonstration in London, Eng. Three gamblers have been arrested, charged with Rosenthal's murder in New York. Ernest Paterson, the first Rhodes scholar from Canada, died in Toronto after three years' illness. Thomas Douglas, formerly of Toronto, run over and killed by train in C.P.R. yards, Winnipeg, on Saturday. W. A. Sinclair, former principal of the high school, Sarnia, Ont., was struck and instantly killed by a street car.

The summer engagements of the empress of Germany have been cancelled. The empress is suffering from heart trouble. It is reported that an officer of cavalry in Toronto, has been dismissed for disregard of anti-liquor camp regulations. Eric Shaeffer, Allentown, Pa., was in connection with the murder of Miss Lovina Price, of Scranton, Pa., committed suicide. The personnel of the Indiana state ticket to be named by the progressive party will include a number of prominent democrats. Plans are being considered by the government for Crown Prince Frederick William to visit the German African colonies in 1914.

Caracas has signed a contract to sing at the National Opera House in Buenos Ayres for at least twelve performances at \$7,000 each. It is not likely that George Neely, former conservative member, will be nominated to contest East Middlesex in the provincial by-election. A delegation from Stratford asked permission of the Ontario government to cancel the city's contract with the hydro-electric commission. The C.P.R.'s station, telephone exchange, lumber yards, and several stores, destroyed by fire at Morse, Sask., on Saturday, loss \$75,000. President Adolpho Diaz has asked the United States for assistance while he gets rid of his minister of war, General Luis Mena, of whom he is afraid.

The Mount Royal hotel property at the corner of St. Catherine and Peel streets, Montreal, was sold for \$1,252,550, or at the rate of \$66.50 a square foot. John Robert Sinclair succeeds Sir J. Ward on the imperial trade commission, and Sir Richard Salomon will represent South Africa, in place of Sir D. P. de Villiers Graaf. The United States battleship Wyoming, on trial at Rockland, Maine, attained a speed of 22.045 knots, said to be the fastest ever made by a battleship carrying twelve-inch guns.

The Vancouver fire which destroyed the Royal George hotel, did damage to the extent of \$1,000,000. All the buildings on the west side of Main street, south of Prior street, were destroyed. An important witness in the Farmers' Bank investigation says he was told by an officer of detectives that he would be landed in penitentiary if he did not testify along certain lines. Following the pope's participation in the ceremonial of the ninth anniversary of the death of Pope Leo XIII, the physicians attending Pope Pius ordered him to suspend all public audiences.

Senor Bartoso, the Spanish minister of the interior, declares that the statement published in the Universe of Orenz, that a revolution had broken out at Lisbon and Oporto, is without foundation. Though the Canadian Northern transcontinental track will probably link the Atlantic and Pacific by the end of 1913, it is not likely that the road will be ready for through passenger traffic for a couple of years. The Manitoba government grain elevators were on Saturday leased to the Grain Growers' company, at six per cent, on the investment, following a conference of the cabinet and the officials of the Grain Growers' company.

MOTOR BOAT IN RAPIDS

IT ENTERED THE LONG SAULT BY MISTAKE.

Thrilling Adventure by Montreal Men—Carried into the Foaming Water of the Open Channel.

Cornwall, July 22.—A forty-five-foot motor boat, the Onome, occupied by a party of young men from Montreal, passed east through the canal, Friday evening, after going through an experience that seldom falls to the lot of either craft or man.

The Onome is owned by J. P. Black, of Montreal, and had on board Mr. Black's son, C. E. Black, Mr. Ducloux, and Mr. Marlowe, of Montreal, and R. L. Lutz, of Detroit. The party were returning from a cruise among the Thousand Islands and on reaching the head of the Cornwall canal at Duckipson's Landing, they found a boat in the first lock. Not being acquainted with the river, they concluded that they had to pass another rapid similar to those they had passed on the way down from Prescott.

They swung out into the channel and had gone too far to get back, when the lockmen shouted a warning to them. In less time than it takes to tell the story they were heading for the foaming waters of the Long Sault. Those who watched from the shore expected to see the boat come to grief when she reached the big rapids, but to their surprise she weathered it and would have gone through safely had those on board maintained their nerve. But not knowing that they had passed the worst of the danger, they headed the boat for the bay just above Sheik's Island, and ran her aground. The compass, windshield, and anchor had been torn away as the rapids were entered.

The party decided to have the boat hauled up the bank and placed in the canal to finish the journey to Montreal. After grounding she was not in condition to try the rest of the rapids.
