AN ADEQUATE PLAN MORE GOOD SCORING

RESORT TO HAVE SUITABLE FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT.

Through Efforts of Progressive Club Park Association Has Agreed to Duplicate Amount Property Owners Raise.

A definite plan of adequate fire protection is practically assured for Thousand Island Park. It is probable that within a few weeks, maybe ten days, the project will be under way. The movement inaugurated by the Thousand Island Park Progressive Club some weeks ago is assuming form and persons in and without the organization have signified their willingness to lend aid to the project. Several pledges of money towards a fund to provide a system of equipment have been made through a committee of the Progressive Club and the Park Association has agreed to raise an amount equal to that collected by the cottagers and other property owners.

At a meeting of the Progressive Club, held about ten days before the recent fire, a committee was named to extend an invitation to the State Fire Underwriters' Association to send an engineer there to look over the ground and advise as to the most feasible plan for securing the protection desired.

The fire had the effect of holding up the matter, but now word has been received from the State Fire Underwriters' Association that an expert will be sent there this week for the purpose of conferring with the people as to their needs.

The Progressive Club will issue a call to cottagers and others interested for a meeting, at which the views of this expert will be outlined.

BRIDGE WORKER KILLED.
Heavy Bucket Fell Crushing His Life Out Instantly.
Quebec, July 22.—Oscar Johnson, a "sand hog" employed at the sinking of the caisson for the Quebec bridge at the Chaudiere, met with a fearful death, Saturday night. He was at work below the river bed, when the bucket used to hoist the debris from the inside gave way and fell on him. It struck the man on the head, knocking him aside lifeless, with both legs broken in several places.

Glenburnie Lady Dead.
A well-known resident of Glenburnie was taken away when Catherine Dowling died in Kingston on Sunday morning, at eleven o'clock, as a result of a complication of diseases, from which she had suffered for some time. The deceased was sixty years of age, and a daughter of the late James Dowling, of Glenburnie, and was a native of the place where she had been so long a respected resident. She is survived by one sister, Miss Bridget Dowling, of Glenburnie. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning at eight o'clock, from the family residence, to the Church of the Holy Name, Kingston Mills, where a requiem mass will be sung by Rev. Fr. Kingsley. The remains will be interred in St. Mary's cemetery.

DONE BY CITIZENS' RIFLE LEAGUE MARKSMEN.

The Team Averaged Over Ninety-five Points, and Broke All Previous Local Records—William M. Baillie Led the Field.

The local riflemen held their third successful rifle match in the Canadian Rifle League series on Saturday, and again made some very high scoring, the team averaging over ninety-five points, breaking all previous local records for ten-men teams and equalling the best performance of teams that were the prize winners last year.

Capt. W. M. Baillie, of the civilians, led the field for the third time this year, with the very high score of ninety-nine points, thirty-three at each distance, 200 yards, 500 yards and 600 yards. E. W. Skinner also made nine-four and thirty-two. W. E. Swaine was third, with ninety-eight points. The scores were:

DROWNED NEAR RAILTON.

James Keeley, Sixteen Years of Age, Met Death.

A fatal accident was the result of a boy's attempt to learn to swim, in Loughboro Lake, near Railton, at seven o'clock, Saturday evening. The best place for bathing along the shore of the lake near Railton is none too good, and when James Keeley, the sixteen-year-old son of Frank Keeley, of Railton, went in, it did not take long for him to get beyond his depth. He had a pair of water wings and they began to slip down to his waist. As they did so his head went down and he was unable to recover. Samuel Potter, a boy of his own age, who was with him, went out and tried to get him in. He got him by his foot and had pulled him within about ten feet of the shore when Keeley gave a kick and Potter lost his grip. After this the drowning boy disappeared.

His friends and parents searched the shore and grappled the lake for the body until one o'clock, but no trace of it could be found. The party was out again on Sunday morning and found the remains at eight o'clock about 100 feet from the shore. The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning to Railton cemetery.

TRENTON CORPS WON.

The Silver Cup at the Barriefield Training Camp.

Being considered the most proficient in instruction, drill, and discipline, as well as the smartest uniformed corps of cadets in the camp, the Trenton high school cadets were awarded the beautiful silver cup, donated by Col. T. Benson, officer commanding, and the officers of the staff of the third division.

MORE THAN SIXTY KILLED.

Victims Include Passengers on Train—Many Burned to Death.

Mexico City, July 22.—According to reports which have leaked out, a number of passengers in the second-class coach of the passenger train, which was attacked by Zapatistas, between here and Cuernavaca, yesterday, were burned to death when the rebels set fire to the train.

More than sixty people were killed and many were wounded in the assault. It had been reported that the thirty passengers in the second-class coach were shot down, but it is now known that only nine were slain outright and that the rest perished in the flames.

A strict guard has been placed over all survivors since their arrival here.
