

## NAPANESE MAN KIDNAPS HIS SON FROM CONVENT

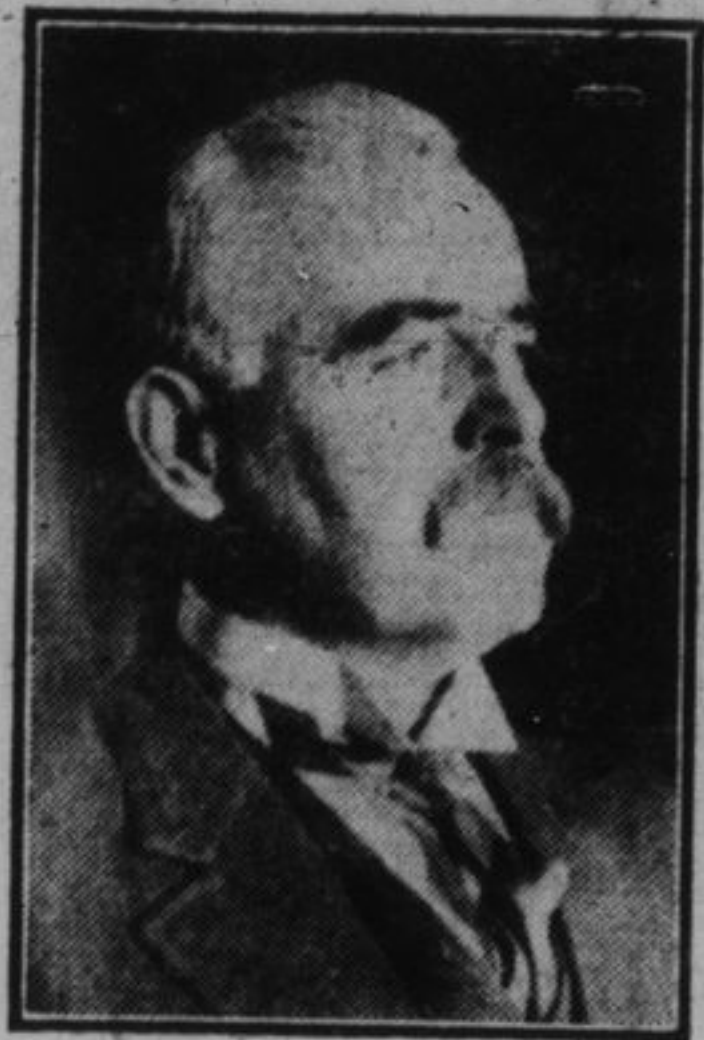
Scales Wall and Jumps Into Waiting Automobile.

Ottawa, July 24.—The cabinet ministers have all been asked by Premier Borden to arrange their summer itineraries that they will all be back in the capital early in September, when a full cabinet council is desired for the purpose of evolving the government's naval policy as a first step towards preparing the legislative programme for the next session.

## FAVORS REPEAL OF THE RECIPROCITY LAW

Taft's Views Unchanged—Opposed to a Law Not Endorsed by Canada.

Washington, July 24.—President Taft has indicated to several western senators, who were active opponents of Canadian reciprocity, that he would favor a repeal of the law. Some of those with whom the president has talked think he may send a message to congress on the subject or that he will state his position in his speech of acceptance when a committee of the Chicago convention notifies him on Aug. 1st of his nomination. Senate leaders say that so far the president has had no direct communication with the finance committee on the subject and has not sent any communication to the committee saying he favors a repeal of the law.

## A GERMAN HISTORIAN

## PRAY FOR THE DEATH

Of Lord Devonport, of English Employers' Association.

London, Eng., July 24.—'Oh God, strike Lord Devonport dead.' This was the strange prayer which went up from the mass meeting of striking dockers held, to-day, on Tower Hill. It was addressed by Benjamin Tibbe and other leaders who referred to Lord Devonport as the greatest criminal of the age. He is president of the Employers' Association and chief of the London dock hence the bitter feeling of strikers against him. The strike has now lasted several weeks and business which was paralyzed for a while, has partially recovered with the help of strike-breakers. In the meantime the strikers are still out. Their families are in a pitiable condition. Municipal and charitable institutions are unable to cope with the situation, and scores are literally starving to death.

## SANK FISHING YACHT

In New York Harbor—Passengers All Saved.

New York, July 24.—The steamer Old Colony ran down a fishing yacht in the harbor here, to-day, cutting her in two and in a few minutes her fifty passengers were struggling in the water. Heroic work of good swimmers aboard the Old Colony and the swift launching of lifeboats resulted in saving every life. The yacht sank immediately.

## DRASTIC PUNISHMENT

Promised Suffragettes Who Try More Violence.

London, Eng., July 24.—Fearing another outbreak by militant suffragettes, who have promised to stop at nothing to secure votes, the detectives engaged protecting cabinet ministers, homes and children, have been doubled in force. Drastic punishment has been promised suffragettes or suffragette sympathizers who try more violence.

## Criticizes Premier For Churchill's Statement.

## STRANGE PROCEEDING

WITH EVIDENT AUTHORIZATION OF BORDEN.

The Nationalist Leader Says That the Canadian Ministers Were Elected to Represent Canada and Not the British Empire.

Montreal, July 24.—Henri Bourassa, in Le Devoir, refers to the 'impertinency' of a British minister undertaking to define the attitude of the Canadian prime minister on the naval question before Mr. Borden had returned to Canada and submitted his policy to parliament and the people.

This strange proceeding had been evidently adopted with the authorization of Mr. Borden. Mr. Bourassa says: 'Till further information is received, it may be taken for granted that Mr. Borden is preparing to return to his attitude of 1909-10, to reserve for an nebulous future the definition of the terms of imperial partnership and the settlement of the condition on which the political authority and the military burdens of the empire will be apportioned. In the meanwhile he is prepared to run to arms on land and sea, and to take an immediate plunge into a policy of preparation against the still problematical dangers that Britain may encounter in the North sea, or the Mediterranean.'

A fresh dose of the Drummond-Arthabaska election medicine might do him good, at the present moment. The editorial proceeds to point out that the Canadian ministers were elected to represent Canada and not the British empire. 'Further,' Mr. Bourassa points out, 'Mr. Borden should know that all participation in imperial naval affairs is distasteful to French-Canadians, and if he has forgotten it we have only to remind him of the vote in Drummond-Arthabaska, where the bye-election was fought out on the naval question.'
