
### Scales Wall and Jumps Into Waiting Automobile.

## CABINET TO EVOLVE POLICY FOR A NAVY

### Ministers Asked by Premier to Be in Ottawa Early in September.

Ottawa, July 24.—The cabinet ministers have all been asked by Premier Borden to so arrange their summer itinerary that they will all be back in the capital early in September, when a full cabinet council is desired for the purpose of evolving the government's naval policy as a first step towards preparing the legislative programme for the next session.

No definite announcement as to what the government will do in regard to the navy can be expected until after the September deliberations of the ministers here.

## GERMANS' FATE

### Would Be Starvation If Cut Off From Sea.

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### POINTS OUT DANGER TO HIS FATHERLAND.

Perlin, July 24.—That a famine would be inevitable in a war that resulted in cutting her off from the sea and that Germany would be in grave danger of being starved into submission and have victory snatched from her by the gaunt spectre of hunger, is the declaration of Prof. Franz Frolich, a noted German historian and military writer in an article just published.

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## Criticizes Premier For Church-hill's Statement.

## STRANGE PROCEEDING

### WITH EVIDENT AUTHORIZATION OF BORDEN.

The Nationalist Leader Says That the Canadian Ministers Were Elected to Represent Canada and Not the British Empire.

Montreal, July 24.—Henri Bourassa, in Le Devoir, refers to the "impudent" of a British minister undertaking to define the attitude of the Canadian prime minister on the naval question before Mr. Borden had returned to Canada and submitted his policy to parliament and the people.

This strange proceeding had been evidently adopted with the authorization of Mr. Borden.

Mr. Bourassa says: "Till further information is received, it may be taken for granted that Mr. Borden is preparing to return to his attitude of 1909-10, to reserve for an nebulous future the definition of the terms of imperial partnership and the settlement of the condition on which the political authority and the military burdens of the empire will be apportioned.

In the meanwhile he is prepared to run to arms on land and sea, and to take an immediate plunge into a policy of preparation against the still problematical dangers that Britain may encounter in the North sea, or the Mediterranean.

The editorial proceeds to point out that the Canadian ministers were elected to represent Canada and not the British empire.

"Further," Mr. Bourassa points out, "Mr. Borden should know that all participation in imperial naval affairs is distasteful to French-Canadians, and if he has forgotten it we have only to remind him of the vote in Drummond-Arthabaska, where the bye-election was fought out on the naval question."

"A fresh dose of the Drummond-Arthabaska election medicine might have a salutary effect," he concludes.
