A NEW TORPEDO BOAT

THAT WOULD REVOLUTIONIZE NAVAL WARFARE. Hudson Maxim Has a New Patent—He Claims That the New Craft Will Supply a Want.

Detroit, Mich., July 24.—A high speed, lightly protected and heavily gunned cruiser that will sink beneath the waves until only a big gun platform remains in sight, is the invention that Hudson Maxim is just now perfecting, according to a statement he made here.

His idea is a further development of a patent he has just obtained on a design for a new torpedo boat which dives beneath the waters from the deck, taking on water momentum just like a railway locomotive on land.

"The water tank," said the inventor, "is inclined toward the stern, so that when the stern valves are opened the water is discharged as quickly as it is taken in."

"At the present time when the high power gun can penetrate almost anything on the horizon, a semi-submergible torpedo boat in place of the present highly vulnerable torpedo craft, becomes very desirable.

The cruise above the water until going into action, taking in water for submergence when it gets within gun range of the enemy.

"I also have a new system for driving torpedoes, which I expect will soon be utilized in naval warfare," continued Mr. Maxim. "These torpedoes are self-propelled and are of much greater speed and range than the present."

"The expense of my submarine craft is nothing like that of the great Dreadnoughts. I do not by any means recommend that we shall stop building Dreadnoughts. I think we should build four a year from now on, with Russia and Japan in fighting alliance the only way the United States can hold its own against them is by building more warships than both of them combined."

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Points. Montreal, July 22.—About 600 head of butchers' cattle, 250 calves, 600 sheep and lambs and 1,025 hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stock yards to-day.

The offerings of live stock at this market during the week were: 1,450 cattle, 625 calves, 1,400 sheep and lambs, and 1,500 hogs. The market was rather dull, but good cattle were held at higher prices than on last Wednesday's market. Prime beefs sold at 7 1/2c to 7 3/4c per lb.; pretty good animals, 5 1/2c to 7c, and the common stock, 3 1/2c to 5 1/2c per lb. A few small bulls were sold at about 3 1/2c per lb.

Calves sold at from 3c to 5 1/2c per lb. Sheep sold at about 4c per lb., lambs at about 7c do. Good lots of hogs sold at about 8 1/2c per lb.; a few small lots at up to 9c per lb.

HON. JACOB BAXTER DEAD.

Was One Time Speaker of the Ontario Legislature. Cayuga, July 21.—The Hon. Jacob Baxter, M.B., registrar of Haldimand county, died yesterday morning. He was one of the best known residents of the Niagara peninsula born in the township of Bertie, Welland county, on June 6th, 1832, he graduated as a doctor in 1850, and after taking a course of lectures in New York began the practice of medicine in Cayuga in 1864. In 1867, he accepted the liberal nomination of the county for the first parliament of Ontario after consideration and was elected. He was re-elected until his retirement, in 1888, except for a few months during which a patron of industry held the county until he vacated the seat on petition. He was elected speaker of the Ontario legislature in 1887, which office he held until 1891.

Hon. Dr. Baxter voluntarily retired from parliamentary life in 1898, and was afterwards appointed registrar of deeds for the county of Haldimand.
