THE ANNUAL MEETING HELD

ON WEDNESDAY.

Progressive Policy Association Has Adopted — Steady Increase in Membership—Lowest Death Rate of Our Canadian Association.

The annual meeting of the Oddfellow's Relief Association was held in Kingston on Wednesday, July 24th. The president of the association occupied the chair, and there were representatives from all the provinces. Among those present were the following:

Summary of Officers' Reports.

The directors reported that the million dollar mark had been passed in January last and that the reserve and mortuary benefit funds on June 30th amounted to \$1,042,451.06. The gross revenue from interest in 1911 was \$34,191.10 and for the last half year \$20,471.20. The disbursements on mortuary account in 1911 were \$22,000, and for the first six months of 1912, \$159,037.20. The securities purchased during 1911, which represent the financial year of the association, amounted to \$134,313.15, and yielded an average rate of 4.76. The debentures held by the association at the end of 1911 were valued at \$90,051.05. The average interest upon these had risen from 4.38 to 4.51. Membership of the association at the end of 1911 was 26,953. On June 30th, 1912, it was 27,895. The mortality was 6.36 per thousand, per annum, and the average death rate was 6.30. This is about the lowest of any society doing business in the province. Grand lodge relations were of the most satisfactory character. From all the grand jurisdictions kind and commendatory words were received and the association and the grand lodges were most intimately associated in promoting the good work.

The secretary-treasurer, R. Meek, reported that the association had, since its inception, disbursed in benefits \$3,046,556.29; the transfer of members from provinces to provinces was increasing and the tendency of the transfers was from the east to the west; the average age of deceased members in 1911 was 51.17, the average death rate per thousand was 6.30; the average age of new members 29.18 and the average age of the entire membership 35.56. A summary of the decisions given by the directors to the legal points raised during the year was referred to the Laws and Amendments committee. The membership by provinces was as follows:

Alberta, 1,838; British Columbia, 1,035; Manitoba, 2,185; New Brunswick, 530; Newfoundland, 2; Nova Scotia, 1,197; Ontario, 16,076; Prince Edward Island, 434; Quebec, 1,216; Saskatchewan, 1,401; and other countries, 613. Total benefits paid in 1911, \$175,228. There were twenty deaths from accidents.

The auditors reported that they had checked over all the books, records, and transactions of the association and found them correct. They also checked over the deposits, the securities in the bank, and the claims and found that they had been properly authorized and paid. Securities to the value of \$59,774.67 had been purchased during the half year and will be reported in the list for 1912, at the close of it.

The superintendents of agencies, A. H. Blakeley, reported on behalf of the bold work. The applications received during the first six months of 1912 numbered 1,662; the number received during the year, from June to June, were 2,651; the rejections numbered 130. The work of the spe-

cial agents in the various provinces was reviewed and reference made to the relations with all the grand bodies, which relations were of the most fraternal character. The association and the grand lodges were working in perfect harmony, and with splendid results to both the order and the association.

The report of Dr. Mundell, chief medical examiner, dealt with the record for the financial year from June 1st, to Dec. 31, 1911. The applications examined numbered 2,658, and there were 131 rejections. The deaths numbered 178, and the percentage per thousand was 6.56; which was an exceedingly low rate for an association of over thirty-seven years' experience.

The statistics showed the necessity of closely watching the history of entrants, so far as tuberculosis was concerned. Duration of membership of those dying during the year was 16.77. Average age of those dying from heart disease was eighteen years and from tuberculosis nine years, nine months.

Reports of Committees.

A. Philips of Huntingdon, from the committee on the extension of the work, reported upon the increasing field of operation and to the fact that each province was now furnishing its quota of members; that the increase was uniform from year to year, and was very certain to continue. Recognition was made of the favorable manner in which the work of the association was regarded by the executive officers of the various grand lodges, and to the assistance which the association had been able to give to these grand lodges. It was expected that these cordial relations would continue. Favorable comment was passed upon the good work of the special agent, now resident in Calgary, and it was hoped that arrangements would be made for the location of a permanent agent at the other two western provinces, namely, Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The work of the superintendent of agencies was spoken of in the highest terms. Adopted.

The committee on laws and amendments, through C. O. Lewis, Chatfield, submitted the necessary change in the laws of the association to conform with the statutes; (7) putting the operators of switch boards in power houses in the hazardous class; making the information from any local agent with regard to the hazardous occupation of members acceptable; making a sailor liable for any proportion of the period of the bi-monthly call which his occupation calls for; and putting policemen, constables, patrolmen and detectives in the hazardous class. Adopted.

The finance committee, through C. O. Allen, St. John, reported upon the growth of the reserve fund from \$41,467.07 in 1893 to over one million dollars at the present time; upon the necessity of providing a capitation tax for the extension of the work throughout the dominion, and submitting an amendment to the laws of the association by which this capitation of \$1.25 will be provided in two installments of 75c to 50c, falling due in November and May; upon the wisdom of the directors in investing the surplus funds of the association in municipal securities, bearing the highest rate of current interest; upon the transfer from the mortuary fund to the reserve fund of \$110,000, making the total of this into one million; upon the renewal of the bond with the United States Fidelity and Guaranty company, covering the officers and agents of the association; and submitting the report of the sub-committee of the finance committee upon the securities of the association which the members had examined. Adopted.

The committee on general business, through J. R. McDonald, Sherbrooke, N.S., reported, referring to the annual meeting of the Canadian Fraternal association over which John Donogh, of Toronto, the vice-president of this association, had presided, alluding to the reference of Mr. Chubb, of the Quebec Insurance department, to the societies of long standing and their death rate, and noting that that of the Oddfellows' Relief association was the lowest; suggesting that the local agents of the association, as far as possible, have proof of the age of members submitted with the applications; recommending that the solicitor and secretary obtain information with regard to the power of the association under its act of incorporation, in view of the desire for a change in the constitution respecting disabilities; commenting favorably upon the good work of the medical examiner, an evidence of which was conveyed in the statistics commanding the use of the Independent Oddfellow and Kindred journals for their services in keeping before the members the good work of the association; and noticing among the accidents, the fact that they occurred among the members who are registered in the extra-hazardous class, justifying the classification of Article XII.

Adopted.

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
