PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over the World.

N. W. Howell, the liberal leader, his colleagues and many supporters left for the north.

William A. Brown, land surveyor, an old resident of Toronto, died in his sixty-eighth year.

The occupants of a launch were drowned in the Detroit river at midnight, Sunday, their boat being struck by a steamer.

Free fares and top wages fall to land harvesters for the North-west, where, it is said, fifty thousand men are required.

The Duchess of Abercorn, in a speech at Lifford, said the women of Ulster were equally eager with the men in resisting home rule.

Theron Fluhannan, Sr., who had been councillor and reeve of worth Dumfries, for several years, died at Galt in his seventy-sixth year.

A twelve-year-old boy, Emery Marshall, of Rosanna, received probably fatal injuries in a 10-foot fall from a loft in a barn at Callowden.

Patrolman L. Robinson, Detroit, Mich., was shot and killed, on Friday by Frederick Milne, whom he was attempting to arrest for burglary.

The Toronto Paper company, whose plant is at Cornwall, Ont., will, it is expected, shortly be taken over by one of the prominent Toronto financial houses.

William Denhall, a twenty-three-year-old South African musician, played a piano at a moving picture show in Pochestroom, for seventy-four hours without stopping.

Seven persons were killed and fifteen wounded in a race war between whites and blacks on the 25th and 26th July, in the vicinity of Plainville and Cathou, Gordon county, in Georgia.

The report that the pope has repudiated the decree, Ne Temere, is absolutely unfounded, nor is it likely ever to be revoked, as it embodies provisions which have governed the church for two centuries.

One man was killed and another probably fatally wounded Monday when Reynolds Forsyth, an ex-convict, for whom the police have been searching in connection with a Flatbush murder, attempted to hold up two East Side stores in New York.

Dr. Boanier, of Paris, says all that is necessary to cure stage fright and nervousness in the pulpit and on the platform, is to insert a red hot needle into the nose and cauterize a certain nerve which is responsible for this nervousness. The cure takes two days.

Miss Gertrude McIntyre, thirty-two years old, and the daughter of one of the wealthiest and most prominent families of Rochester, N.Y., ended her life in her expensive studio apartment, No. 166 Schermerhorn street, Brooklyn, Monday, a victim of "impulsive insanity."

The strike of the conductors and motormen of the Boston Elevated Railway company, which has lasted fifty-three days, and is estimated to have cost \$1,028,000, was ended Monday night by the agreement of the company officials to the terms of settlement, the strikers winning every point sought.
