Ottawa, Aug. 1.—It is understood that an issue has arisen between the government and the Grand Trunk Pacific which may possibly result in sensational developments. It is as to the time at which the Grand Trunk Pacific should begin to pay interest or rental on the cost of construction of the eastern division of the line from Winnipeg to Moncton. Under the Grand Trunk Pacific's contract with the dominion government, the time named when the com pany should begin to pay interest is seven years after the time when it is taken over and operated by the Grand Trunk Pacific. The government has made a demand that to carry out the intention of this agreement, the company's interest-bearing ! period will begin seven years from the date of completion, not of the

entire section from Winnipeg to Moncton, but seven years from the completion of individual sections, It will be immediately seen that this raises a big issue, because while the section of the road from Winnipeg to Superior Junction has already been completed, the entire road will not be completed for a long time. The Quebec bridge alone will probably cause a delay of several years on the eastern end. 

Use of Typhoid Vaccine is

MAY BE WITHHELD BY THE GOVERNMENT.

The Epidemic Bids Fair to Become Worse Than That of a Year Ago-Vaccine . Will 'Protect Against Typhoid for Five Months,

Ottawa, Aug. 1 .- On account of the ever-increasing gravity of the typhoid epidemic at the capital it is rumored that the dominion government may withhold the \$50,000 grant promised to the city to aid in the holding of the dominion exposition here. The situation continues to grow in seriousness, and from present indications the epidemic bids fair to become even worse than that of the winter of 1911, when the record was 1,600 cases. With the ****** a little over two weeks old, there are now 510 cases reported at the city hall. Seven deaths are already recorded, and the emergency hospital has been called into commission, there being now no less than fifty cases in that

That the epidemic. is increasing with alarming rapidity is evident from the fact that wthin the past twenty-four hours ninety additional cases have been reported. Most of these are considered mild, but the progress of the disease is not far enough advanced to form even approximately any estimate of what

the death list will be. Three of the seven deaths so far occurred in the local hospitals yesterday.
