AMERICAN CONQUERS GLACIER.
 Highest of Canadian Rockies Surmounted at Last.
 New York, Aug. 3.—The conquest of Mount Sir Sandford, the highest peak in the Rockies, by Howard Palmer, secretary of the American Alpine Club, is announced in a message sent by Mr. Palmer to the American Geographical Society. The ascent of the mountain, which is 11,634 feet high, and is practically one continuous wall of ice, was made on June 24th. No less than eight separate attempts to scale the icy fastnesses of Sir Sandford have been made during the last half dozen years. No other peak in the Canadian Rockies has such a record. Only five of the expeditions ever reached the base of the mountain, and aside from the present expedition only one (that of Captain Culver, of Winnipeg, in 1911) actually set foot on the peak itself.

Although it is among the highest of the world's mountains, it is the glacier which covers its surface which makes climbing difficult.
