A MAN-EATING SHARK.

Killed on Deck of Boat After a Struggle.

New York, Aug. 8.—A man-eating shark, twelve feet long and weighing nearly 400 pounds, gave the ten men on board the fishing schooner, "Tanya Bitters," the greatest excitement in their fishing career off Sandy Hook yesterday. The huge shark was caught in the meshes of the schooner's net and finally landed it flopped about so that more than half the crew were knocked to the deck time and again. The men used the power with large sheath knives, until the shark succumbed. It is the first monster of its kind seen in these waters for many years.

THE SUM OF \$676,147

Lies Unclaimed in the Banks of Canada.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—A report issued by the finance department shows unclaimed balances in the banks amounting to \$676,147, unpaid dividends totalling \$3,650, and unpaid drafts on bills of exchange for \$49,857 at the close of the fiscal year. In unclaimed balance there is an increase of \$38,000 over last year's, in unpaid drafts, etc., \$10,000. These balances under present conditions represent a heavy burden, but it is understood that legislation will be introduced through the new bank act by which they will revert back to the people through the government.

30,000 STAYED IN ONTARIO.

Immigration Officials Make Report For This Year.

Toronto, Aug. 8.—Thirty thousand immigrants have come to Toronto since the season began seven months ago, and twelve thousand have stayed here, the remainder going to provincial points. The immigration officials state that roughly speaking, thirty-five per cent. of the newcomers have stayed in Ontario this year, so it would appear that the immigration total for the dominion would be about eighty-six thousand so far from Europe. Of those who have come to Ontario almost twenty-eight thousand had from Great Britain, less than three thousand coming from the continent of Europe.

The figures include two thousand domestic servants. The heaviest month so far for the immigration authorities was May, when no less than 7,500 people came to the province.
