HOUNDED FROM WORK

BRUTAL ATTACKS ON LIBERALS AND CATHOLICS

In the Belfast—Shipyards—The Gospel of Hate Preached by Hon. Law Has Fallen on Fruitful Soil

Belfast, Aug. 10.—Through the Belfast shipbuilding industry never was in a healthier condition since Lord Pirrie assumed control of the Queen's Island, and more than doubled its capacity within a limited number of years, 4,200 men who had remained active and steady employment are now tramping the streets in idleness.

About 200 Catholic Nationalists and 200 Protestant radicals and specialists were expelled by brute force and threats of violence from Messrs. Workman and Clark's shipyard during the opening days of July. A day or two later 2,000 men—including 200 or 300 Protestants—were driven out of the immensely large establishment owned by Messrs. Harland and Wolff. This morning 1,700 others were thrown out of work by the latter firm in pursuance of the notice published on Saturday, and it may happen that 10,000 wage-earners will find themselves workless before the end of the week.

The troubles have sprung direct from the political teaching of the English and Irish unionist party. For a decade the people have lived peacefully in the city, but the seeds of the gospel of hate preached at Omagh, Craigavon, and Balmoral by Sir Edward Carson and Bonar Law fell on fruitful soil. The bitter crop has already sprung into existence.

During June and last July organizers had approached every Protestant worker in the shipyards and smaller centres of employment. Several workers who knew the consequences of refusal joined the clubs against their will and conscience. Hundreds declined the invitation, and these men were marked.

On July 2nd several hundreds of men and boys formed themselves into "squads" at Workman and Clark's yard, and "raided" with mathematical precision the quarters in which nationalist and radical workers were pursuing their occupations.

The "obnoxious" workers had been "spotted," and were readily placed out from their lodges, kicked, and even hammers, driven bleeding and dishevelled for the most part through the gates, and cautioned against ever reappearing. A few harbor police within the yard were powerless. Two hundred and fifty nationalists, and from 120 to 150 radicals were "cleared" that day.

The next day some of these expelled workers returned in defiance of the threats. They were "spotted" again, and in company with fifty others, nearly all the Protestants who had escaped molestation on July 2nd, were violently hurled out. The doors of Messrs. Harland and Wolff's were busy on July 2nd and 3rd. That evening a strong brigade of Workman and Clark's employees raided the adjoining establishment and, augmented by a host of Unionist Club members in Harland and Wolff's, rushed wildly through the works of the latter, sending out the nationalists and radicals who were not members of the clubs or lodges, and repeating the brutal behavior practiced in the lesser yards.

Before the end of that week Catholic nationalists and Protestant radical or socialist workers had been wholly "cleared out" at Workman and Clark's and only those Catholics and Catholics who were not recognized remained in the greater establishment.

Messrs. Harland and Wolff posted a warning notice on the evening of July 7th. They said:

"Unless the disturbances in these works cease immediately and all our hands are allowed to follow their occupations peacefully, without interferences, the firm will be reluctantly compelled to close until further notice."

All the expelled workers remained out during the week following the week of the "twelfth," and yards were not reopened until Monday, July 22nd, a general resumption of work being fixed for Tuesday. Very many nationalists or radicals made the experiment of returning to Workman and Clark's. Indeed, many of the radicals, and practically all of them who were Englishmen or Scotchmen, had crossed the channel seeking for employment elsewhere in Clyde. Several hundred nationalists and nearly all the Protestant radicals went back to Harland and Wolff's.

The "pogrom" was resumed without delay and the operations were conducted in a more systematic manner. After a week of fruitless effort the persecuted men abandoned the attempt to earn their livelihood, and the notice issued by Harland and Wolff brought the issue to a critical point. In the meantime Workman and Clark quietly reloaded the expelled workers by non-union laborers.

Excellent hundred men who sought admission to Harland and Wolff's yard were informed that their services were not required as the plant of the department to which they were attached must remain idle owing to the expulsion by violence and threats of the skilled men who had charge of it.

During the month the Catholic and Protestant radical workmen displayed the most exemplary patience. Hundreds of them and as many families are on the verge of starvation and an urgent appeal for funds to relieve pressing cases of destitution is being issued.

The continuance of the work or otherwise depends upon the men. Rowdiness will not be tolerated under any circumstances. Probably the nationalists and radicals will make another attempt to resume work. If they are not interfered with the vast premises will resume full work. If the brutal policy of the unionist classmen is continued the proprietors will shut down the establishment and transfer their contracts and other work to the Clyde or Southampton.

The Montreal harbor commissioners will this fall begin building their new elevator, each of 2,500,000 bushels capacity.

Three of the eighteen Detroit city officials, under arrest for some time, have confessed. There are still more arrests to be made.

Allan Williams, seven-year-old son of John Williams, physical instructor at St. Andrew's college, was drowned in Twelve Mile Creek.

Dr. David Rolinson, registrar of Halifax and some years ago its representative in the legislature, died suddenly at Nelson, B.C.

The Duke and Duchess of Sutherland sailed for Canada Saturday on the Manzanita. The duke has large holdings in the Canadian west.

Mrs. Lydia A. Rockwell, who is dead at the age of 106 years at her home in Hyde Park, Boston, was until two years ago, an expert fisherman.

Six hundred members were present at the fifty-third annual convention of the Canadian Medical Association assembled on Saturday in Edmonton.

Acceptance of the Panama canal bill, practically as passed by the U. S. senate, was decided upon Saturday by the committee of the House of Representatives.

Major Beattie, M.P., is endeavoring to have the government build a new postoffice in London, Ont., instead of enlarging the present one, as has been contemplated.

The Montreal police have been warned that the suffragettes were determined to make Montreal a centre for their operations during the forthcoming visit of Winston Churchill.

Just before Fred James, the murderer of Constable Ashern was hanged Saturday morning at Kamloops, B.C., he threw pepper in the guard's eyes and attempted to escape.

Ontario still faces the fact that although her fruit products are deemed to be unsurpassed the falls in securing the best of the market by reason of inferior methods of shipping.

The engagement is announced of Lionel De Rothschild, M.P., and Marie Louise, youngest daughter of Munc. Edmond Beer, of Paris, and sister of Baroness Robert De Rothschild.

During the three months, April 1st to June 30th, of the current fiscal year 175,341 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 121,978 arrived at ocean ports and 53,343 at the United States.

A call has been issued to the women of the United States, particularly those of the states where women vote, by the four women members of the Progressive National committee, asking support for the party.

William Andrew's, twenty-five years of age, living at No. 342 Westmoreland avenue, Toronto, was electrocuted on Carlaw avenue Saturday afternoon while at work at the top of a Hydro-Electric pole.

Murdered after she had been assaulted, the body of Miss Annie Calisen, a music teacher, aged twenty-five, who lived in Aurora, Col., was found near the end of the car line leading to that suburb.

Queen Elena, of Italy, has presented signora Papa, an Italian woman recently expelled from Asiatic Turkey, with an artificial nose. Signora Papa was attacked by a band of Arabs during anti-Italian riots and her nose bitten off.

According to Hon. J. D. Reid the government has not been notified either through the attorney or the commission of any friction between the G.T.P. and the government with regard to the taking over of the Winnipeg Superior Junction section.

President Taft has selected Secretary of State Knox as his personal representative at the funeral of the late Emperor Meiji of Japan. Secretary Knox will leave Washington on August 15th, sailing from Seattle on a naval vessel. The funeral will be held in Tokio, September 12th.
