FAST TELEPHONE WORK. Montreal "Hello Girls" Faster Than Toronto's Maidens. Montreal Herald. Montreal "Hello Girls"—in the matter of smart telephone work, could hold their own with the best trained London, Chicago or Toronto operators.

This is evidenced by the result of recent tests made at the local main office, figures concerning which were made public by J. A. Anderson, traffic chief of the Bell Telephone Co. The Montreal tests, which are based on an average of 3,000 separate and distinct connections, indicate that the Montreal operators answer a call in a little less than four seconds after the caller has taken down the receiver. The standard time as laid down by the Bell Telephone Co. for this operation is four seconds, exactly, but the figure is often bettered, some operators being able to answer a call a little over three seconds.

During busy months, Mr. Anderson pointed out, the average time taken by an operator to answer a call was five seconds, while the average time taken to answer a call and obtain the party called, where there are no trunk connections to be made, was between seven and eight seconds. When tests were taken of calls made from one exchange to another, the average time consumed in making the complete connection worked out at 21.6 seconds.

In Toronto the same "trunk" average in the month similar to that in which the Montreal tests were taken worked out at an average of 18.4 seconds, but then it was pointed out by operators in Toronto had not nearly so many lines to look after as their cousins by profession in the Montreal main office.

Observations made upon 59,000 telephone calls in Chicago and London recently disclosed the fact that Chicago operators on an average could answer a call in 3.1 seconds, but to make a complete connection consumed 25.4 seconds, or over four seconds more than the time taken by Montreal operators. The London tests showed that English operators which are the lowest of all required 5.1 seconds, to answer a call, and 28.6 seconds to obtain the number asked for.

In Toronto the average for answering a call is 4.9 seconds. A Lengthy Stock-in-Trade. The late Will McConnell, an advance agent and a Broadway character of recent renown, was standing in the baggage room of a railroad station in company with Mel Stoltz, another advance agent.
