VICTIM OF HEROIC ACT APPROVED OF LEASE

REV. FATHER KLAUDER YIELDS HIS LIFE.

Tried to Save a Drowning Girl, and Developed Pneumonia—Conducted Mission in St. Mary's Cathedral, Kingston.

Word has been received in the city of the death of Rev. Father Francis E. Klauder, pastor of St. Mary's church, Annapolis, as the result of an attack of pneumonia, which developed in consequence of an unsuccessful attempt to save the life of a drowning parishioner, Miss Mary Woytych. While at a picnic held by the church Miss Woytych went in bathing and got beyond her depth. Father Klauder heard her cries for help, and, unmindful of his own safety, plunged into the waters to save her. Two others also started for her assistance, but before they could reach the drowning girl, all three became exhausted, and had to be rescued themselves.

Father Klauder was afterwards stricken with the severe illness which caused his death. He will be remembered by Kingstonians, as about two years ago, he conducted a mission at St. Mary's cathedral. He was a man of handsome presence, pleasing and attractive personality and strong magnetism. All who knew him loved him.

Whitby is to have a \$18,000 Carnegie library, the plans having been approved by the Laird of Skibo.
The first farm laborers' excursions of the season from the maritime provinces are the biggest on record.
Grand Trunk earnings for week ended August 7th were: 1912, \$1,109,682; 1911, \$1,017,982; increase, \$91,700.
Hon. Adam Beck will merge his four plants into a company to be conducted partly on the co-operative plan.
Ten men were sentenced to death at Sebastopol, for taking part in a revolutionary plot against the czar.
Two shippers are sailing the United States boat Michigan against the Canadian Patricia at Chicago, Wednesday afternoon.
In a vain effort to save her two-year-old son, who fell from their yacht into the harbor at Buffalo, N.Y., Mrs. Emma Clark lost her life.
Thomas Jebb, a farmer of King's county, N.B., committed suicide. He had lost all his early crops and his hay was destroyed by bad weather.
Inspector Shaw, St. Thomas, in the course of his rounds on the Horton market, collected thirty samples of butter from farmers of which twenty-one were under weight.

John Yammick, a ball player of Pittsburgh, is a real "homebody." Highwaymen fired three shots point blank at his head, but the bullets flattened on striking his cranium.
The Royal Mail steam packet company of London, Eng., has given orders to a Belfast firm for four new liners, for the Panama canal traffic, to meet anticipated German competition.
Ellie Gladys Virtue, of St. Paul, Minn., who is completely crippled as to the use of her hands, has completed writing a novel of 175 pages, upon a typewriter, with her toes.

Frank Griffiths, a Toronto drug clerk, went violently insane, and before he could be oversuaded, he smashed hundreds of dollars-worth of goods and fixtures.

Miss Mabel Boardman, sister-in-law of Senator W. Murray Crane, Massachusetts, who recently succeeded Clara Barton as active head of the International Red Cross, is to be made advisory chairman of the campaign committee of the Women's National Republican Association.

Bought by Bishop Fallon.
London, Ont., Aug. 14.—It is generally stated here that the handsome residential property of Hon. Adam Beck has been purchased by Bishop Fallon, who will use it for his own private home. The property is located quite close to the site of the new \$150,000 seminary.

OF KINGSTON AND PEMBROKE RAILWAY TO THE C.P.R.

Meeting of Directors and Shareholders of Kingston and Pembroke Railway Held in Kingston, Wednesday Morning—Officers Elected.

At the annual meeting of the directors and shareholders of the Kingston and Pembroke railway, held in the head offices of the company, here, on Wednesday morning, the lease of the Kingston and Pembroke railway to the Canadian Pacific railway was approved. This statement was given out after the meeting. All the terms, etc., of the lease were under discussion, but no information of this nature was given out. The announcement that the Canadian Pacific railway would take over the lease was made some time ago. The change, so it is understood, goes into effect the first of the new year. The matter will, of course, have to come before a meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific railway at Montreal.

The work of the year was gone over and regarded as quite satisfactory. The members approved of considerable more ballasting to be done on the road, and also the putting in of some more new steel.

W. D. Matthews, of Toronto, was re-elected president, and Walter R. Baker, of Montreal, vice-president and general manager.

The following directors were elected: W. T. Baker, J. B. Walken, K. C., W. F. Nickle, K.C., Robert Crawford, Hon. William Hart, Kingston; H. P. Timmerman, A. R. Croelman, K.C., Montreal; W. D. Matthews, J. T. Arundel, Toronto.

After the meeting was over the directors, with F. Conway, general freight and passenger agent, and James Irving, engineer, left on a special train, made up of the coaches Frontenac and New Brunswick, to make a tour of the line.

SAFEGUARDING BABIES.

How Peasantry Arrange Future of Youngsters.

The peasantry of Greece firmly believe that the future of every child is determined by three fates, known as the Morai. The trio is supposed to be three old and wrinkled women who dwell in a mountain cave, and who come simultaneously to the house in which a new baby has made its appearance. In order that their aged and uncertain feet may not be hindered, all furniture is carefully set aside, and honey, cakes, bread and wine are set out so that the important though invisible guests may refresh themselves. If the household is sufficiently wealthy to possess a little real money, this too is placed on the table with the food.

All things, good and bad, are in the hands of the three fates. On no account must the child's beauty be alluded to at the time when the visitors might be present. It is said to do so would cause the good looks to instantly disappear. Nothing must be said or done which might in any way annoy or displease the Morai, and this makes the situation a bit difficult, as no one is quite sure what might or might not please them.

The idea that ill luck will be the portion of the child who cuts its upper teeth first, is found in several lands. Among one or two African tribes this superstition is so strong that they regard it as a mercy to promptly kill any child whose upper teeth appear first, and they do so.

Should a child grow up had in China, it is merely remarked that the parents forgot to bind its wrists, alluding to a very widespread superstition that if a red cord is tied about the infant's wrists it cannot fail to grow up quiet and obedient.

Spaniards lightly sweep the faces of their children with pine boughs in order to assure it a happy future. To keep an Irish baby from harm, a belt of woman's hair is placed about it, and with the same object the Roman mother ties a red ribbon around the ankles of her infant.

In Holland, garlic, salt, bread and steak are put in the cradle of a newly born child, so that it may never want for food during its lifetime, and in order that the child of Wales may always be protected, a pair of tongs and a knife is placed in each bed. In Iceland, the cutting of the first tooth is celebrated by giving to the child a tiny lamb.

THE "DEVIL SHIP."

Motor Vessel's Voyage to and from Far East.

The motor-ship Selandia, the first mechanically propelled passenger and cargo vessel to be independent of steam power, completed her first round voyage to the Far East when she arrived in London after a voyage of 21,500 miles. In spite of the fact that the vessel embodies many new principles, and was strange to her engineers, only one slight adjustment of the exhaust valves, involving fifteen minutes' rest for the engines was found necessary during the entire trip. In all matters of fuel consumption, ease of manoeuvre and general behaviour the vessel far exceeded expectations.

The Selandia's progress east of the Suez Canal occasioned great excitement amongst the natives. The mystery surrounding the absence of funnels and sails resulted in her gaining the name of the "Devil ship," and as such she was heralded from Bangkok to Singapore. Great incredulity existed as to the nature of the vessel at first, even amongst the naval officials of one important Eastern country, but this was dispelled after a day's cruise upon her.

The success of the voyage has led the owners, the Danish East Asiatic Society, to order three other motor ships of greater tonnage.

The fuel consumption fell considerably below that estimated by the builders. On her home voyage the Selandia averaged ten nautical miles per hour on a consumption of 85 tons of oil per day. During her stay in the Far East the Selandia, which is handsomely appointed as a passenger vessel, was utilized by the Crown Prince of Siam and his suite for a short cruise.

FORGERY AT BROCKVILLE.

Bogus Cheque for \$150 Was Successfully Negotiated.

Brockville, Aug. 14.—A bogus cheque artist put one over a young clerk relieving the teller in the local branch of the Northern Crown bank. The stranger, a man about thirty-five years of age, professing to be Thomas Smith, presented a cheque in his favor for \$150, made out in the name of John Beatty of the Bank of Toronto, where a farmer of that name, living at McIntosh Mills, has an account.

The money was handed over to the stranger without any questions being asked. Subsequently it developed that the signature of Mr. Beatty was a forgery. The alleged "Smith" had previously attempted to negotiate a loan at the other banks, but failed. The police cannot find any trace of him.
