R.C.H.A. BAND CONCERT
 IN MACDONALD PARK WAS GREATLY ENJOYED.

Visiting Scotch Teachers Were Present—Their Musical Experts Congratulated Bandmaster Light.
 The R.C.H.A. band, on Thursday evening, played a concert of exceptional merit in Macdonald Park. The programme was well chosen and the numbers rendered called forth from many in the place of a couple of the scheduled numbers, the bandmaster inserted a couple of Scotch selections for the better entertainment of the Scotch school teachers who were visiting the city. He replaced the first number, "Europe United," with the "Kilties March," a melody of Scotch tunes, and the "Suite de Ballet" with the favorite number of the evening, "Aibion." This piece was made up of a number of favorite Scotch airs which followed one another through the first part and were cleverly interwoven into a finale in which "God Save the King" and "Rule Britannia" provided the melody. The piece embraced many of the old airs that warm the blood of every Scotchman, and are admired the world over for their charming melodies. Among these were "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms," "The Minstrel Boy," "Annie Laurie" and others. It also included a very clever imitation of the Highland pipes, which introduced the finale.
 That the concert was enjoyed by the Scotch visitors was clearly shown when some of them came forward to compliment the band. Among these, one was Lewis J. Owen, musical master to the Wick board schools of Scotland, who commended the work of the band warmly and gave Bandmaster Light the highest praise for the excellence of the music he was providing.
 "The Glow-Worm" and "Killarney" were other favorite numbers, and the concert solo work of Sgt. Huberland in "Killarney" was certainly worthy of the greatest praise. Once the band was obliged to cease for a moment to give a change of the overflowing spirits of some ill-controlled boys near the stand. It seems a pity that this nuisance must continue, but it is being regulated as much as possible. The concert proved one of the most interesting of the season.

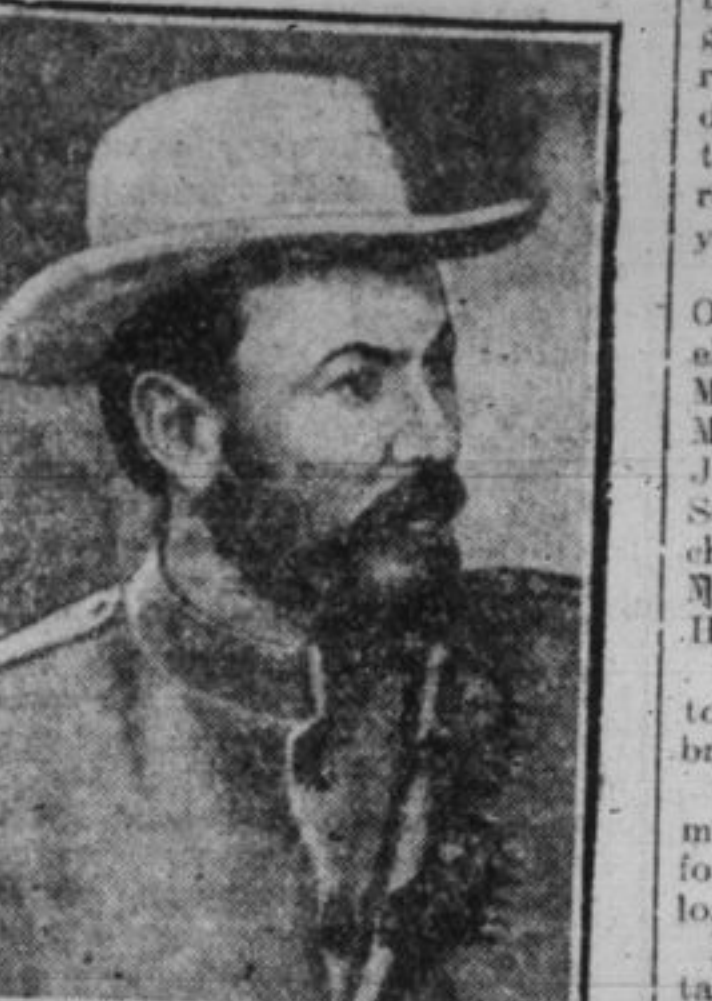
MAKES PROTEST
 Against the Use of the Death Penalty.
 Washington, Aug. 16.—Plea for the abolition of the death penalty, following the seven executions at Sing Sing, was voiced by Mrs. Champ Clark, wife of the speaker, in an interview granted a United Press correspondent.
 "I am unalterably opposed to capital punishment," Mrs. Clark declared. "The seven executions by New York state are a striking example of the social inefficiency of the death penalty. I think as Bulwer Lytton said, 'the worse use you can put a man to is to hang him.' I would not like to be responsible for taking what I could not give—human life."
 "If these victims of the electric chair in New York could have been put at some public work, making roads or parts of other employment for the public good, how much better it would have been for society. There is work for public betterment that big, strong men can do, instead of ending their lives by execution."
