**A BASEBALL LEAGUE FOR QUEBEC PROVINCE**

Is the Latest Scheme of "Knotty" Lee—The Intercollegiate Rugby Union is Preparing for the Fall Games.  
 Catcher Graham is scouting for Toronto in the New York State baseball league.  
 George Goulding, the world's champion walker, has announced that he has no intention to retire.  
 Commodore Thomson, of the Chicago Yacht Club, announced that he will build a challenger for the cup the club has just lost to Patricia.  
 Umpire "Bill" Phyle, of the Canadian league will report for duty at Toronto, Monday, in his first engagement on the International league staff.  
 The Brooklyn club is after "Black" Dever, the Guelph left-fielder. Fryer holds the records for long hits on most of the ball fields in the Canadian league.

Charles Isaac, the popular third-sacker of the Guelph Maple Leaf, who has been purchased by the Toronto club, is chosen as the best third-sacker in the Canadian league.

Saturday's match between the Toronto and National teams may decide the championship of the Big Four. If Toronto wins it will be all over but the shouting.

Baseball has changed of late. Pitchers are being promoted to managers, and direct the play. A few years ago they wouldn't let a pitcher on the coaching lines of the major leagues.

It is estimated by the officials at the Westside baseball grounds, Chicago, that 90,000 persons will witness the series of three games between New York and Chicago, and for this privilege they will pay \$70,000.

A lacrosse commission to govern the national game throughout Canada, patterned after the national commission which governs baseball across the border, is a certain next year, declared President Con. Jones, in the Vancouver Province.

C. Mack's Philadelphia world-beaters are slowly squirming their way to the top of the American league pennant squabble, and the Red Sox will have to be at their best to maintain their position which enables them to lay claim to the loftiest perch.

The United States golf association contemplates changing the present arrangement for deciding the national golf title. Instead of having all the competitors play each day, commencing some time in the morning, it is planned to have two or three sections.

At the close of the present Canadian league season "Knotty" Lee, to whom all the credit of the existence of the above league is due, will go on a trip through the province of Quebec with a view to organizing a class "D" baseball league in the lower province. He figures that such places as Hull, Sherbrooke, Three Rivers, Stanstead, Richmond and Quebec City would be the towns to get interested in organized baseball, where the game would thrive as they should be assured of big crowds on Saturdays and Sundays of every week and be the means of paying sufficient to play seven days a week.

Ottawa Journal: Everything is shaping up for a fine battle in the Intercollegiate Rugby union this fall. The Varsity team of last season will be practically intact; the college team will suffer the loss of a couple of players, but they will also be strong. McGill will have Billington, their famous punter, back in harness, and hope to line up a majority of veterans when the first game is played.

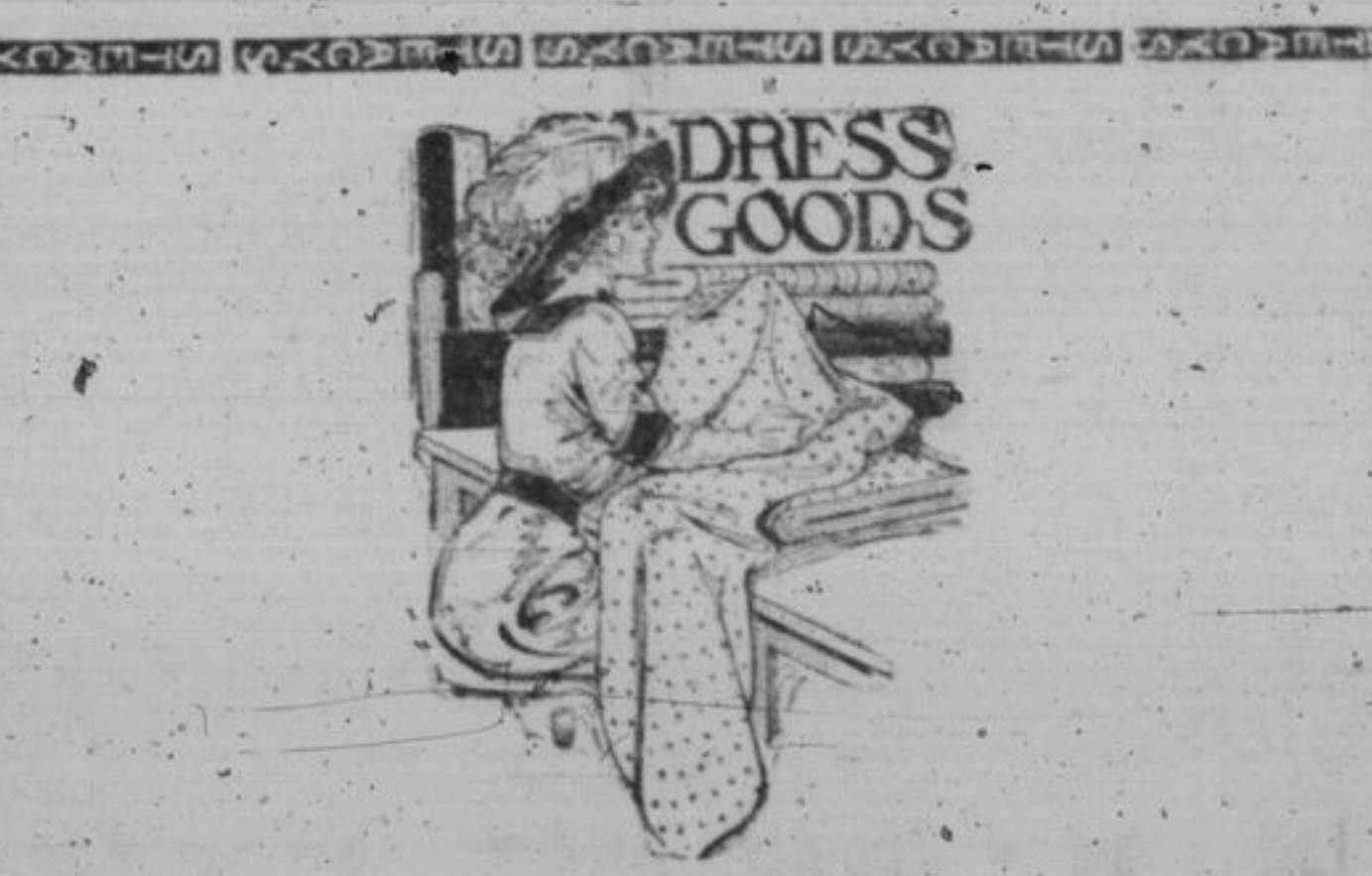

**CHARLOTTE HARBOR.**  
 Examination. With a View of Improving it, is to be Made.  
 Rochester, N.Y., Aug. 17.—The war department has ordered Col. J. G. Warren, corps of engineers, in charge of this district, to make an examination of Charlotte harbor, and report the desires and needs of the shipping entrance and leaving the harbor. The examination is a result of action taken by the Charlotte Harbor Improvement committee, which has asked the department to widen the river one hundred feet and deepen it to twenty feet. It is estimated that this work would cost \$345,000.

**Tourist Sleeping Cars.**  
 It is interesting to note that, keeping pace with the appreciation shown of this class of accommodation, the Grand Trunk railway system has arranged for the operation of entirely new and up-to-date sixteen section tourist cars. These cars are electric lighted, upholstered in leather and a large comfortable smoking room is provided. The berths are of most approved style and are sufficiently large to accommodate two persons, if desired. Cars leave Montreal each Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10.30 p.m., arriving Chicago at 9.25 p.m. the following day where connection is made with trains carrying similar accommodation for all points west and south-west. Smoking cars are also operated east-bound tri-weekly. Passengers desiring to use day trains from Montreal and make use of this class of sleeping accommodation may travel by train No. 1, "International Limited," and have space reserved for the night in cars which they join at London at 8 p.m., and occupy them until they arrive in Chicago, 5 a.m. the following day. Second-class tickets are available for passage in these cars and for convenience of out-of-town patrons, space may be reserved in advance on application to any Grand Trunk agent or to J. Quinlan, district passenger agent, Bonaventure station, Montreal.
