"JUMPED THE JOB"

STEAMER KINGSTON HELD UP ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

An Endeavor Made to Secure Stokers Here, But it Was Not Successful--The Latest Events in the Harbor.

The steamer Kingston was delayed three hours over her time at Swift's wharf, on Tuesday evening. Three of her firemen "jumped the job" at Prescott in the morning, leaving the fire-boat somewhat handicapped. An endeavor was made to secure men in Kingston, but it is understood was unsuccessful. The steamer cooled at Kingston, instead of Charlotte, N.Y., and cleared up the lake at eight o'clock in the evening.

The schooner Kewatin cleared for Oswego, N.Y., for coal, on Wednesday morning. Swift's wharf: Steamers Toronto and Caspian, down and up; steamer Rideau, down and up; Ottawa, down; Rideau King, down, from Ottawa; steamer Dundurn, west, and Belleville, east.

The spikes at the entrance of Big Soda Bay, N.Y., are to be removed by the government scows and derrick, which proceeded to the bay from Little Soda about a week ago. The owners of small craft have encountered serious accidents by running over one of the sunken obstructions.

M.T. Co's elevator: The steamer McKinstrey arrived from Fort William, with 59,000 bushels of oats and 26,000 bushels of wheat; steamer Beverton, from Fort William, discharging 57,000 bushels of oats and 36,000 bushels of wheat; steamer Gordon, from Fort William, discharging 72,000 bushels of wheat; tug Bartlett cleared for Port Dalhousie, with the barge Hamilton, to load grain, and will return with oil bags No 37; tug Bronson cleared for Montreal, with two grain barges.

The steamer Fairmount passed, this afternoon, light, on her way from Montreal to Superior, where she will load ore for Sydney. The steamer Domacocna passed down, Wednesday morning, loaded with grain, from Fort William, to Montreal.

The schooner Kitchen arrived, light, from Cobourg, and will load feldspar at Richardson's wharf. The schooner Ford River is also loading feldspar at this wharf, but will not likely clear for Charlotte until about Friday, as they are waiting more feldspar from the mines.

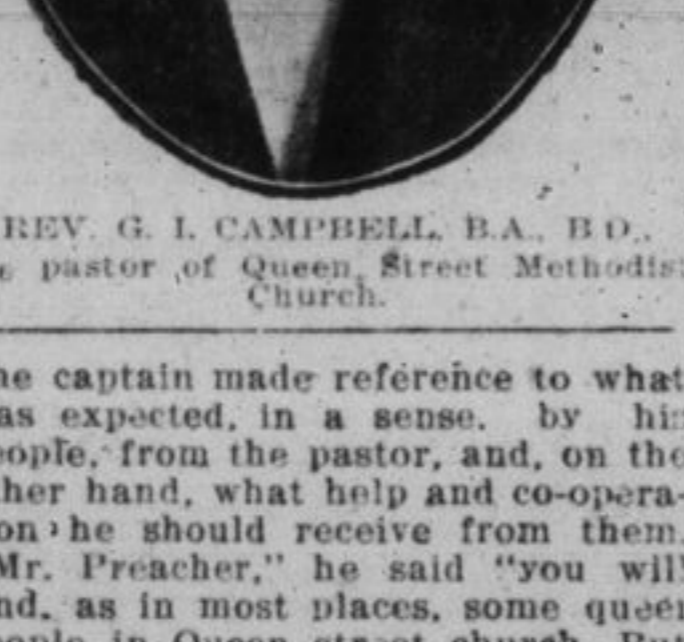
The steamer Fairfax, of the Hepburn company, arrived from Belleville, and will undergo some repairs to her machinery, at the Kingston foundry.

WELCOME TO PASTOR CITY COUNCIL MEETING

APT ADDRESSES GIVEN AND SONGS RENDERED.

A hearty greeting to the pastor and his wife--The Aims of the Preacher--Help Acquired From the Flock.

Rev. G. I. Campbell was formally welcomed to the pastorate of Queen street Methodist church on Tuesday evening. The lecture hall, which is now being used for service, while the church is being redecorated and renovated, was filled with members of the congregation, all gathered for a pleasant hour.

The captain made reference to what was expected, in a sense, by his people, from the pastor, and, on the other hand, what help and co-operation he should receive from them. "Mr. Preacher," he said "you will find, as in most places, some queer people in Queen street church. But there is a reason. We depend upon you to knock some of these peculiarities out of us. Instead of criticizing the pastor, let us rally round him with enthusiasm. Give him the 'glad hand' often."

Captain Crawford said with a good preacher, optimistic, in the prime of life, and willing to work, the Queen street church would surely prosper. Mr. Campbell responded, thanking the captain and the members of the congregation for the kindly welcome. He spoke of his and his wife's interest in everything and every person in the church. He said he had his ideal of what the Christian minister should be, to which he had ever aspired. And also, an ideal for the church, which must be modified and reconstructed. Material progress brought problems she must solve. Mr. Campbell asked for the support, co-operation, and prayers of his people, for there was room for improvement in every part of the organization of the church.

R. J. McLellan spoke, on behalf of the Young Men's Club, in connection with the Sunday school, and the part the members take in the work. Four of its members had canvassed the congregation and raised \$2,000 for the church improvement. The work of improvement, to cost \$3,200, interiorly and exteriorly, was explained by Robert Meek, who said he believed there was a revival of prosperity at hand. Upon receiving Queen street church it would be a credit to the congregation.

C. De Carteret, the treasurer of the church, who the chairman said "sat on the cash box," made a statement regarding the financial position--free from debt, since the burning of the mortgage two years ago. The programme was interspersed with solos by Miss A. VanLoven, of Watertown, N.Y., in very fine voice, and Mrs. J. Evans, as well as a duet by Mrs. Evans and J. Shea. Miss Mabel Milo was accompanist.

PLAN OF PROPERTY OF EX-MAYOR GRAHAM APPROVED.

Tender Awarded for Steam Turbine Equipment at Light Plant to Follow up Extensions--City to Secure a Lease of Cedar Island.

At a special meeting of the city council, held on Tuesday afternoon, ex-Mayor Graham, presented his plan of the property of the Duff estate, which he recently purchased on Garret street, and it was approved by the council and the necessary resolution passed. The meeting was called for this special purpose, by Mayor Hoag, who presided. Mr. Graham, in session, they also decided upon the tenders for the electrical plant extensions, under discussion some time ago.

Mayor Hoag was in the chair, and the other members present were: Ald. Bailey, Gouper, Elliott, Fair, Givens, Harrison, Keel, Linton, McCarthy, Peters, Rigney and Stroud. As the result of an act recently passed by the Ontario legislature, it is necessary for the council to approve of plans for property such as ex-Mayor Graham has purchased, before the same can be registered, and it was for this reason that it was desired to have the matter put through, as speedily as possible.

Ex-Mayor Graham had his plan before council, and after it was viewed, no time was lost in approving of the plan. Ald. Harrison moved the resolution, and in doing so, stated that the lots were but thirty feet wide, which he considered rather narrow, but this was something over which the council had no control.

Ald. Elliott, chairman of the board of works, brought forth a recommendation which was carried. The board asked for authority to purchase a steam roller (eighty-five tons), at an estimated cost of \$3,000; melting pot, \$500, and street watering wagon, \$300.

Ald. Rigney, chairman of the civic utilities committee, submitted a report, recommending the acceptance of the tenders for the electrical plant extensions, decided upon recently, and they were passed upon. It will be remembered that in connection with the tenders for the steam turbine equipment, it was decided to select General Manager Folger away to examine some of the machinery in operation, so that he could get necessary information about it. Mr. Folger returned home on Tuesday afternoon, shortly before the session of council opened, and in order to go on with the work as speedily as possible, the chairman had the matter put through.

Selby & Youden, of Kingston, were awarded the tender for two return tubular boilers, at \$2,250. The tender for the turbine equipment was awarded to the Ontario Electric Power Company, at a total cost of \$16,800. The equipment consists of the generator, condenser, with the valve and fittings complete.

Mr. Folger addressed the council, briefly, in regard to his trip. He visited Pittsburgh, Pa., and I. S. Selby, manager in charge of the General Electric company, and that of the Westing house, and was able to secure a great deal of information regarding the work in his department. His trip was a most beneficial one in every respect, and he was glad to say that when they gave their manager the opportunity of making the trip. It was absolutely necessary to make the extensions at the plant.

Ald. Rigney reviewed the power situation, and the report recently given by an expert, who was called in to decide on the power offers. Mayor Hoag had some good news to give to the council before adjournment, which was to the effect that he had received a letter from W. F. Nye, M.P., stating that the government had cancelled the lease of Cedar Island, given to a Kingstonian, and that the lease was about to be transferred to the city.

Death of James Kirkwood. CANONIC, AUG. 20.--It becomes our duty to chronicle the death of an old and respected resident in the person of James Kirkwood, who died at his home here, Friday morning, after a month's illness. Mr. Kirkwood was eighty years old. He leaves a family of five sons and four daughters to mourn his loss. The funeral took place Sunday and was largely attended by sympathetic friends and neighbors. Rev. Wesley Hall, Plevna, officiated, and preached a very impressive sermon.
