PROFITS OF 20 MILLIONS IN ONE DEAL

England to be a Sugar Maker—To Protect Foreign Buyers of American Cotton.

New York, Aug. 20.—A little more than \$20,000,000 was cleared—about seventeen years ago by William Rockefeller, and H. H. Rogers in a single deal. These men purchased gas and electric properties in Brooklyn for under \$5,000,000 and issued \$25,000,000 of securities of the new company incorporated discounting in advance Brooklyn's growth in population and appreciation in property and franchise value. Their only oversight was the modest capitalization. They might have made more. In 1895, the property value of the Brooklyn Union Gas Co. was less than capitalization by \$20,000,000. To-day, property value exceeds capitalization by over \$17,000,000. During the seventeen years five per cent. a year has been paid on the bonds and an average dividend of six per cent. on the stock. Owning virtually all the stock and bonds of the Brooklyn Union Gas Co., in 1895, H. H. Rogers and William Rockefeller had distributed the larger part of their holdings at the time of the former's death. Standard Oil interests own a much smaller amount of Brooklyn Union Gas securities to-day than has generally been supposed. In other words, they have long since cashed in the greater portion of their 1895 profits and have received good income return on the remainder.

A Great Beet Concern.

London, Aug. 20.—The Anglo-Netherland Sugar Corporation, Ltd., formed last December, with \$2,000,000 stock and \$2,000,000 five per cent. bonds, expects to begin sowing beets in October at its plant at Cantley, Norfolk, marking inception of beet sugar manufacturing in England. The company has contracts for about 3,500 acres of beets, for which it will pay \$5 a ton. This is the first time that a beet sugar factory has been started in a country where there is neither a beet system nor a protective tariff. If it can be made profitable, it means that England will in time be able to keep at home a major portion of the one hundred and twenty-five million dollars she pays annually for foreign sugars.

Further steps for protection of foreign buyers of American cotton, who lost upward of \$10,000,000 last year ago through fraudulent bills of lading, have been taken by Liverpool conference committee.

Montreal, Aug. 20.—The British Columbia Copper company's metal production for the first ten days in August was the largest in the history of the company. The earnings, as published for July, do not include earnings from its Dominion Copper company investment. Including the total, it is more than double its dividend requirements.

Financial Tidings.

The Grand Trunk railway system, earnings from Aug. 8th to 14th show the following increase: 1912, \$1,098,423; 1911, \$1,048,062; increase, \$50,361.

Production of soft coal in Pennsylvania in 1911, 189,329,000 tons, against 148,700,859, the year before, or the third highest of any year of the industry.

The Holland Paper Co., Ltd., Montreal, who have sold an issue of \$500,000 per cent. bonds, will devote the proceeds to the sale of enlarging their plant at St. Adèle, in order to take charge of the increased demand for their well-known brands of paper.

The oldest Dutch mortgage company working in the United States, the Nederlandsch-Amerikaansche Land Maatschappij, has issued a circular to its stockholders proposing a change in the by-laws in order to enable it to extend its sphere of operations to Canada.

Government figures place Alberta's grain yield above 60,000,000 bushels. "Considerable comment is heard on Erie railroad stock. The activity has induced a following. It is noted that the stock sold above fifty when the road was in a much poorer condition. Taking the outlook into consideration many good judges believe there is warrant for considerably higher prices.

"Over sixty per cent. of the Rio and Sao Paulo shares have been deposited for exchange up to the present," said Sir William Mackenzie. "We are quite satisfied with the way the shares have been coming in, and the exchange will be largely added to so that its capacity will be trebled.

Fined Sixty-seven Cents For Each Oath.

Hollidaysburg, Pa., Aug. 21.—Hollidaysburg Association are warring against profanity and blasphemy in western Pennsylvania towns. At the trial of a prosecution against Thomas Winslow, for uttering twenty-five oaths, Magistrate M. Calvin Lewis remarked:

"The dictionary makers say that there are 200,000 words in the English language, and the law makers have prohibited the uttering of three words Father, Son and Holy Spirit, irreverently. The language is, therefore, big enough for any angry citizen to express his wrath without using either the prohibited words. Under the blue laws it will cost every offender a fine of sixty-seven cents in my court for each oath."

TOWN STOPS POWER LINE.

Campbellford, Ont., Aug. 20.—The town has stopped the Seymour Power company from continuing its line to the Trent Valley and other mills affected by the construction of the new Trent Valley canal. The dam across the river on which the industries affected south of Bridge street depended for power is being removed by the government, and the Seymour company had been called upon to fulfil its part of the agreement with the government. The company promised to give, when required, power to the industries affected at cost. The people of Campbellford objected, but the company proceeded to build the line into the town. Its franchise, however, only gave it the right to go on Rear and Rennie streets, and the authorities stopped it in preparation before it could go on Bridge street, in order to reach the mills. The town has a municipal power-plant and thinks that it should have the privilege of tendering with the Seymour company for the supply of power to the mills.
