AT THE POLICE COURT

ALB. D. A. GIVENS PRESIDING ON WEDNESDAY MORNING

In Absence of Magistrate Farrell—Stranger Could Not Cash Cheque But Managed to Get Drunk—Another Chapter Heard in Case of 'Stray Hens.'

Magistrate Farrell was out of the city on Wednesday, and Alb. D. A. Givens had the honor of handling the scales of justice.

Lewis Mensall was the first to be arraigned, Drunkenness was the charge lodged against him, and he pleaded guilty. His story was that he came from 'Coe Lake' for the purpose of cashing a cheque. He declared that he could not get the cheque cashed at the local hotels, but his condition showed that he had been able to sample the liquor all right. He was engaged on some railway work there, and further explained, that he guessed that he would have to go to Belleville to get his cheque cashed. "Well, you had better go to Belleville," remarked the court.

And Mensall was led away to await the first train for the west.

A second chapter, in the case of John Reynolds, charged by one of his neighbors, Ann Pitt, with having allowed his hens to run at large, was heard, and a further adjournment for a week made, as the magistrate desired to secure more information. Reynolds said that perhaps one hen might have strayed away from his place, but he was sure that all of his hens had not been the cause of all the trouble. He claimed, further, that his hens were "kopt in" with the use of some wire netting. The court, however, was not ready to give a decision on Reynolds' evidence, and this caused a further adjournment for a week.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels in and Out of This Port.

The government supply boat Loreta, which has been visiting the light-houses on the Bay of Quinte, called at the Wolfe Island ferry wharf, on Wednesday, on her way back to Ottawa. The Montreal Transportation Company's large Candor has been floated from the dock of the Kingston Shipbuilding Company, after repairs, and another of the company's barges has been docked. Swift's wharf: Steamer Kingston, down and up; steamer Capitan, down and up; steamer Rideau King, down from Ottawa; steamer Dundurn, west; steamer Belleville, east.

The steamer Geronia was at Folger's wharf, Tuesday night, on her way from Montreal, and had a big list of passengers and a heavy cargo of freight.

The steamer Toiler arrived at Richardson's elevator, with a cargo of damaged grain, from Montreal.

The steamer Sowards discharged coal at Rockwood hospital, and cleared for Fairhaven.

The ship Shibley cleared for Bath, with general cargo. M. T. Co's elevator: The steamer Turcot Chief, grain laden, from Fort William, will likely arrive to-night, to discharge; the steamer Canadian, after discharging her cargo of grain, cleared for Belleville, to load coals. For Fort William: The tug Somerset, cleared for Port Bathurst, with two barges, which will be loaded with grain, and will return with the barges Ungava and Melrose, grain laden, from Montreal; the tug Bartlett is due to arrive with the barge Hamilton, grain laden, from Port Colborne, for Montreal; the tug Bronson will arrive from Montreal, with two light barges, and will clear for Montreal with three grain-laden barges.

The steamer Rosemount will pass up, to-night, on her way from Sydney to Fort William, with a cargo of rails. The steamer Stormont, loaded with rails, is due to reach Montreal today, on her way to Fort William.
