And Other Famous Artists to Visit Kingston. What is easily the most important musical move made in this city is the arrangement to bring to the Grand Opera House the above famous operatic and concert stars. Heretofore great artists have visited Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa, but either through lack of knowledge of our musical importance or for some other reason have overlooked us, until two years ago Frederic Shipman gave us Melba and it is this same impresario who now offers us the above artists, and the same series that he has placed in New York, Chicago, and the larger American and Canadian cities.

Madame Lillian Nordica, America's greatest singer, and the world's most famous dramatic soprano, is booked as the second attraction, on October 25th. The Diva will be assisted by Runnall, the eminent violinist, and Romayne Zimmons, pianist. And last, though not least, comes the female Paderewski, Mary Hallock, who has been highly styled the "Embrant of the piano." This last and first concert of the series is billed for November 25th.

Has Nursed for 45 Years. In connection with the death of Lord Lister it is interesting to know that the nurse who assisted the famous surgeon with his first antiseptic preparations is still in the Glasgow Royal infirmary. Nurse Bell has many interesting stories of the old days when Prof. Lister was in the infirmary, and the crowd of students and dressers, many of them now chiefs, who attended the cases from 1861 to 1879.

Nurse Bell has been in the Royal infirmary for forty-five years. She is now sixty-nine years of age and she enjoys good health, though not able to do much. When Lord Lister was presented with the freedom of the city of Glasgow four years ago it was his desire that Nurse Bell should be present at the function in St. Andrew's hall. When the memorial service was held in the university chapel she had a special invitation to be present.

TO PRESERVE EGGS.

Eggs packed and treated as follows can be kept three months, and soon and look like fresh eggs. Take a common box, such as is used for packing tinned tomatoes; upon a two-inch layer of fresh, clean oats, place the eggs, large end down, and leave space of at least an inch between the eggs, cover with a layer of oats, and then place another layer of eggs until the box is nearly full; fill it with oats; packing the grain in neatly, and screw on the top; place your box in a cool cellar, and turn it upside down every other day.
