Outlook for Stock Markets Reported Favorable — How Cheese and Butter Sold at Various Centres.

Cobalt, Sept. 2.—The revival in the more speculative interests in the silver camp is getting more pronounced every week. Each week sees the announcement that some company with its name on the geological map as the only guarantee that it ever existed is opening up on a small tentative scale. The discovery that good silver ore is to be found in the diabase underlying the keewatin at the Beaver mine will revive many faint hopes in South Coleman and the Cochrane, the Gifford and the Clifford Extension all have their admirers. The Meteor, adjoining the Savage and under the lee of Diabase Hill, will try its luck once again.

Stock Markets' Outlook.

London, Eng., Sept. 2.—The general outlook for the stock markets in the next few weeks is favorable. The rise in our bank rate is in some sense an actual "bull point," because, while the rate is not high enough to check speculation, it is sufficiently high to warrant hopes that there will be no immediate further advance. Rubber, silver and mine stocks are again strong and active, and there is something like a boom in shipping shares. Stocks of that sort are booming also at Berlin. The real basis for the present active condition of ocean trade and the advance in freight rates, but there are also current all kinds of combination rumors.

In their preliminary estimate for the world's wheat crop of the current season, H. N. Rathgate & company make the grand total 3,438,000,000 bushels. It realized this will beat all former records, being 15,100,000 bushels greater than the former record crop of 1906. The United States leads the world with 680,000,000 bushels and Canada ranks sixth with 280,000,000 bushels, Russia, India, France and Austria-Hungary standing higher in the order given.

Cheese Markets.

Cowansville.—At the meeting of the Eastern Townships Dairymen's Association held here butter all sold at 26 1/2c, and cheese all sold at 13 1/2c.

St. Hyacinthe, Que.—Butter sold today at 26 1/2c; cheese at 13 1/2c.

Canton, N.Y.—3,200 boxes of cheese sold at 15 1/2c, and 600 tubs of butter at 27 1/2c.

Belleville.—At the cheese board 1,565 boxes were offered; 1,115 sold at 13 13-16c, and the balance at 13 1/2c.

Listowel.—At the cheese board here nine factories boarded 1,794 boxes of cheese, namely, 779 boxes of white and 1,015 boxes of colored. On the board the bidding started at 13c and went up to 13 1/2c, at which price one factory sold. On the "Street" all was sold, several reporting one-eighth of an advance.

London.—Offerings at cheese market were 320 boxes, of which 255 were sold. Bidding from 13c to 13 1/2c.
