THE SPORT REVIEW TWO YOUNG MEN SHOT

TORONTO LOST TWICE TO ROCHESTER ON TUESDAY. IN THE CHARIVARI PARTY AT WOLFE ISLAND.

Still Lead by Four Games—Trouble in Ottawa Rugby Circles—Jack Williams Not Likely to Play Again.

The Toronto baseball team lost both games to Rochester on the latter's grounds on Tuesday afternoon, the first by 6 to 2 and the second by 9 to 2. The Torontos still lead the International League by two games.

Ottawa Rugby Troubles.
An Ottawa despatch says that there is trouble in rugby circles there. "Jack" Williams is not likely to play again, owing to his injured knee, and Disney, Kilt and others are up in arms over the change in the management, consisting of Jack Ryan, James McCaig and Frederick Carling. It is expected that Ottawa Rugby Club will enter a team in the O.R.F.U.

To Visit Watertown: Again.
The strong Canadian Locomotive Baseball Club, of Kingston, Ont., whose cranks gave the New York Air Brake team a hard beating here last Saturday, will be seen in action here again next Sunday.

The team they will play on this trip in the Watertown Baseball Club, and it is expected that the Canadian team will make a formidable showing. They have a number of star twirlers on their roster and the hits that they made against the Brake last Saturday caused so much anxiety to those who were unable to see Saturday's game has prompted the locals to put them on.

Toronto Should Win Pennant.

Baseball fans may size up Toronto's pennant chances from the following: Rochester has still twenty games to play—five with Toronto, nine with Buffalo and six with Montreal. Toronto has eighteen games to play—five with Rochester, seven with Montreal and six with Buffalo. Dealing in possibilities, Rochester could win the pennant by copying sixteen out of twenty-one games to be played, provided that at the same time Toronto lost eleven games. In other words, the Leafs must develop a terrific slump if they lose their present grip on the flag. Supposing Rochester should lose only four games during the remaining two weeks of the season, the Huskers' standing would be ninety-three victories and sixty defeats, for a percentage of .64. In that event Toronto would have to drop nine games in order to lose the pennant. The Torontos won't lose nine of the twenty to be played.

Rifle Being Used Exploded, and Victims Are Now in Hotel Dieu in Serious Condition—Doctors are Using X Ray—Expected both will Recover.

Francis Baker and William Kiell, two young men belonging to Wolfe Island, are in the Hotel Dieu, in a serious condition, as the result of the explosion of a rifle, when they were taking a prominent part in a charivari party at the island, Wednesday morning.

The marriage took place on the island, at 10.30 o'clock Wednesday morning, of Miss Shea, daughter of Michael Shea, and James Derry, two well-known young people on the island, and Messrs. Kiell and Baker were members of a party who made arrangements to give the young couple a "send-off." However, the affair turned out rather serious for them. In some unaccountable matter, the rifle exploded, and the young men received its contents.

Dr. C. A. Morrison, of Kingston, was hastily summoned, and taken over to the island in a motor boat, and after attending the injured men, had them removed to the Hotel Dieu. This afternoon, doctors were using the X-ray on both of them.

While in a serious condition, it is expected that both will recover. One of the young men received about thirty shots in the shoulder and the other, twelve in his head.

DETAINED BY THE FOG

STEAMER TORONTO REMAINED HERE ALL WEDNESDAY.

It Had a Narrow Escape From Running Ashore—Hailed From the Land, and the Engines Were Reversed.

The steamer Toronto had a close call from going ashore, in the fog, on Wednesday morning. Some time after daylight, so one of the passengers told the Whig, he was standing near the bow, when the steamer was hailed from the Amherst Island shore, a very short distance away. The engines were immediately reversed. The whistle had been blowing during the night, and many of the passengers were on deck.
