TRAVERS IS TO HAVE RUSSIA HAS TROUBLE

ANOTHER BANK ENQUIRY TRIP TO TORONTO.

He is the Social Leader Among the Penitentiary Prisoners—No Favors are Shown to Him.

The Toronto Star of Friday contains the following:—
The former general manager of the bankrupt Farmers Bank hopes to get another trip to Toronto when the inquiry resumes this fall. At the present time he is the most distinguished prisoner of the provincial penitentiary at Portsmouth contains. All the other prominent convicted men who spent some years of residence in the big prison have been released, and the ex-manager of the last Canadian bank to bring woe to its small stockholders, is the social leader in the prison of which Douglas Stewart, penitentiary inspector, is acting warden.

"Travers" cell is in the dome section of the main building, and his daily work so far has been to sweep the corridors. No favors are shown him, it will be seen. "Travers" health is good, and he has no complaint to make about his treatment. When he was brought down over a year ago, he made the remark that no prisoner had any reason to complain of the treatment given by the officers if he did as he was told. He is quite content to take his punishment, and remain within the walls of the prison three years more, for he will be liberated some time the autumn of 1915. Already he has served more than a year and a half of his six-year sentence, which, deducting good behavior time, is equal to four years and nine months.

Just after Travers entered the penitentiary, it was reported on good authority that he had decided to turn Roman Catholic, and would make application to the department of justice to be allowed to attend the Roman Catholic chapel services. It would seem, however, that he had not done this, for he attends the Protestant services every Sunday. All prisoners are required to attend some religious service.

On Watch.**

Good luck to the three taverns which are selling temperance drinks to the townspeople, says the Lampman, who hopes that they will have as great success as the pink lemonade booths at a circus. If people are content to drink two-per-cent. beer and ginger-wine, Kingston's breweries and soft-drink places of manufacture should flourish. No whiskey has been manufactured in this town (legitimately) for many years, but at one time the Morton distillery could give cards and spades to all comers in the matter of making the purest whiskey; in fact present-day whiskey couldn't hold a candle to the Kingston-made liquor, it may be; the Lampman remarks, that when the licensed taverns see what a success the non-licensed fellows are making by selling non-intoxicants, some of them may throw up their licenses and save \$500 a year.

The town council is to resume its sessions, the Lampman notes, and he would respectfully ask the reason why. The council has been holidaying all summer, and so far as being of any service to the people, it might as well continue to holiday, if it would only allow the town officials to do the people's business. The summer is the most important time in town affairs, and when Kingston can practically do without its council for those three months, it can do without it for the rest of the year. However, for old-time's sake, the Lampman is willing to suffer the town councilmen to gather fortnightly around the old horse-shoe.

Another Presbyterian minister of the town has completed a quarter of a century's service in his congregation, and the Lampman notes with satisfaction that the people of Chalmers church next Friday, to recognize the occasion by tendering a reception to Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray, who is one of the most cultured preachers who ever occupied a Kingston pulpit. If there's another minister of the gospel in the province who has anything on the Chalmers pastor in the way of information on scientific and philosophic matters, the Lampman would like to shake hands with him, for anything that Dr. Macgillivray does not know about things from animal life to farming, is likely to be discovered. It is a fine man the Chalmers people have. The Lampman remembers him when he came here and first appeared in 1887, in the high camped pulpit of the old Earl street church, and he thinks it a pity that the new Chalmers has not a similar Scottish pulpit from which its minister could preach the Word. He dislikes the wee desks that are put in the new, norman churches.

DIVORCE MARRIAGE QUESTION AS WELL AS OTHERS.

Wife's Refusal to Change Her Faith is a New Cause for Divorce, According to Bishop's Ruling.

Odesa, Sept. 6.—The Woman's Rights League is just now keenly interesting itself in a somewhat extraordinary episcopal obiter dictum of Bishop Antonius of Volhynia. This pronouncement practically creates an additional cause upon which an orthodox Russian may base a plea for divorce from his non-orthodox wife. Names are not mentioned, but it appears that a couple of years ago an orthodox resident in the government of Volhynia, in virtue of the "freedom of religious confession" clause in the imperial manifesto of October 30th, 1905, recanted his faith, and joined the Roman Catholic church. He subsequently married a Polish lady. Recently, repudiating his "perversion," he again recanted, and was readmitted as a member of the state church. He sought to persuade his wife to become proslavni (orthodox), but she firmly refused. On this ground he now seeks for a divorce, and Bishop Antonius ex-officio supports his suit, formally and publicly declaring that the cause assigned is legitimate and valid.

The Woman's Rights League is taking steps to have the case brought before the senate, and will also have it laid before the holy synod. As, however, divorce procedure in this country is still partially governed by the ecclesiastical authority, it is not at all improbable that the holy synod will uphold the action of Bishop Antonius. The state church differentiates between the letter and the spirit of the "freedom of religious confession," promulgated in the imperial ukase referred to. It was formerly a criminal offence for an orthodox Russian to abandon his faith, and was punishable by imprisonment or banishment.
