homes during their stay in our midst. This state of things is likely to exist in any university town, and the difficulty has been met in various ways in different cities. In Oxford, England, for instance, many of the best families have felt it a philanthropic duty to treat some one university girl as a paying guest, during her college course, and a large number of women students have thus received a lasting benefit from the culture and refinement of such homes. It is probable that there are many families in Kingston who could without inconvenience offer a room at least to some university girl, and make her feel that she is not a stranger in the city.

The housing of women students has always been a serious problem at Queen's. This year, however, the difficulty is increased by the fact that the senate, complying with a very fitting request from the girls themselves, has made a ruling that women students shall not room in a house where men lodgers are taken. All friends of the college girls feel that this action on their part was entirely praiseworthy and well calculated to promote the best interests of all concerned.

Now, will not every family within a reasonable distance of the university consider whether it is not feasible to relieve the situation by offering one room, at least, to a college girl for the price she would have to pay in a regular lodging house? Immediate action is imperative, as about one hundred new girls will arrive in Kingston within three weeks who must be provided with rooms for the college year.

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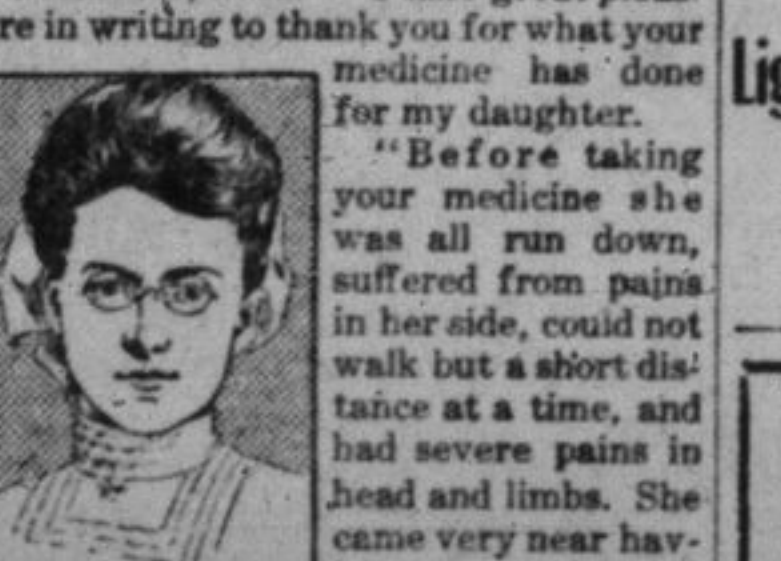
