LATE REV. J. R. SERSON

FUNERAL FROM CHRIST CHURCH, GANANOQUE.

To Pakenham on Tuesday—Two Young Ladies Thrown From Carriage When Horse Ran Away.

Gananoque, Sept. 11.—The funeral of the late Rev. John Reaby Serson took place, yesterday, and was very largely attended. On Monday evening, while the casket lay in state in Christ church, large numbers were there to view the remains. The service, at 11 a.m., was in charge of the dean of Ontario and Archdeacon Carey, of Kingston, assisted by some sixteen clergymen of this diocese, and was a most impressive one. From the church a large crowd followed the casket to the T.R.R. station, where it was placed in a special car, and left at 12.45 for T.I.R. Junction, to which point it was accompanied by six members of his congregation, selected by himself some months ago, Messrs. W. J. Gibson, Russell H. Brown, George J. Johnson, A. D. Howe, John McGloghlin and William A. Barton. Mr. Serson and family accompanied the remains to Pakenham.

The Winona Mission Circle was re-organized yesterday. Tea was served from six to seven, followed by a business meeting.

Quite a serious runaway accident happened about five o'clock yesterday afternoon, while Miss Kate Webster, daughter of Nathaniel Webster, liveryman, with her friend, Miss Gertrude Price, were enjoying a drive. The horse, which at first came through the east of the town and turned short, throwing both young ladies out. The horse, continuing its flight through the town, was captured near the western outskirts of the town, being and harness being badly damaged, but the injuries to the horses were not of a serious nature. Assistance was promptly at hand for the young ladies, and Dr. Sinclair was called and made the run in his auto, bringing the young ladies home, where it was found that both had received severe, but not dangerous, injuries.

THE JEWISH NEW YEAR

Begins Wednesday Evening—Will be Solemnly Observed.

Wednesday evening marks the official beginning of the Hebrew new year. The holiday is otherwise known as "Rosh Hashanah" and is observed very closely by Jews of all classes.

The day is observed seriously and solemnly by all classes of Jews. The blowing of the trumpet, the "shofar" or ram's horn, is the peculiar service of the day. It is the bugle call of the Spirit, and is supposed to arouse the consciousness in contemplation of mispent hours, and awake the impulse to make the coming year more fruitful of noble and useful action.

The ten days following the new year are passed in solemn meditation and reflection and culminate with the Day of Atonement, or "Yom Kippur," which falls on September 21st, or, to be more exact, at sunset on September 20th. It is the most sacred and the most religiously kept day in the year and the observant Jew abstains completely from all food and drink during its continuance. The day is devoted to prayer and penitence and the orthodox Jew remains within the synagogue from early morning until sunset.

The ancient service, with its elaborate ritual and imposing priestly sacrifice and confessional, has disappeared and in its stead has come a simple service. On this day the offices and business houses are closed and the houses of prayer are thronged with worshippers.

New Millinery Department.

Miss Philip, of Toronto, has arrived in the city, to take charge of the millinery department about to be opened by the Messala store. Before coming here, Miss Philip visited New York and Boston, in the interests of the firm, and the ladies of Kingston are sure of seeing some of the very latest creations in tailored hats. The date of millinery opening will appear in tomorrow's paper.

A Signalling Practice.

A practice was held Tuesday evening, of the 14th P.W.O.R. Signal Corps. Lieut. L. C. Lockett was on hand and gave the boys an hour's flag drill, reading and receiving messages. These classes will be continued for signallers on through the winter.

The board of directors of Y.M.C.A. will meet on Tuesday evening and a new physical director will then be appointed.

CANADA'S FELDSPAR

IS FOUND WITHIN 100 MILES OF KINGSTON.

Report of the American Consul—Uses of the Rock—Only Three Firms are Exporting It.

According to a statement made by F. S. S. Johnson, American consul at Kingston, all the feldspar mined in Canada is found within a radius of one hundred miles of Kingston, from which point it is exported to foreign countries. The Canada Year Book shows that in the year 1911, the largest production ever recorded in the feldspar industry, the output being greater by 1909 tons in quantity and \$4,257 in value than that of 1910. The production in 1911 was 17,718 tons valued at \$51,150, against 15,809 tons valued at \$47,667 in 1910.

The principal use of feldspar is in the manufacture of pottery, enamel ware, enamel brick, and electrical ware. Of these the most important is its use in the body and glaze of pottery and vitrified sanitary ware, in which it constitutes from ten to thirty-five per cent. Its value in pottery lies in the fact, that it melts at a lower point than the other ingredients and serves as a flux, binding the clay and quartz together. In glazes the percentage of feldspar used is higher than in the body and runs from thirty to fifty per cent. Other uses of feldspar which do not require the high grade demanded by the pottery trade, are in the manufacture of emery and corundum wheels where it serves as a flux; in the manufacture of opalescent glass; as a pottery grit; as a constituent of roofing material; and as ballast. Small quantities of the purest grades of potash feldspar are used in the manufacture of artificial teeth. For this purpose it brings the highest prices, from \$6 to \$8 a barrel of 350 pounds. It is also used in the manufacture of scouring soap and window wash. The use of feldspar of the lower grades for poultry grit, roofing, etc., seems to be on the increase and in 1911 a small quantity was used as railroad ballast.

There are only three firms in Canada exporting feldspar and they are in Kingston district. The summer shipment is made by water, and in winter, by rail.

CONSIGNING GOODS.

Has an Improved Method of Handling Express.

The Canadian Express company has recently adopted throughout its entire system of seven thousand miles of railway and steamship lines, a carefully worked out plan, having for its object the prevention of double collection of charges at destination when shipments have already been prepaid; the prevention of overcharges and undercharges and the elimination of the occurrence of packages going astray or being found over without mark, resulting in delay in delivery and inconvenience and loss to the public.

The foundation of this new plan for the correct receiving, billing and handling of shipments is the fact that waybills and packages labels of distinctive colors are used. For example, all packages, the charges on which are to be prepaid, will bear a label printed on golden red paper. This serves as a warning to all employees that charges are not to be again collected. Where charges are to be collected at destination a white paper label is used; for C.O.D. shipments, green paper, and for shipments in bond, pink paper labels. Waybills printed on paper of corresponding color will also similarly distinguish the one class of business from the other. A waybill is made in triplicate for every consignment, one copy which contains full particulars of consignee, address, weight and charges being pasted on the package; one copy being handed to the train messenger, in whose custody the package is forwarded, and one copy retained for office use. For mutual convenience special arrangements are made with large or regular shippers to supply them with labels to be attached to shipments in advance of the call of the driver.

Where a consignment consists of a number of packages a special "shipment" label is placed upon each package which gives reference to the entire consignment. This, it is expected, will prevent packages which are a part of a consignment from going astray, and will go a long way towards removing the difficulty which the public have heretofore experienced.

The Canadian Express company relies upon the co-operation of its patrons in making this system effectual for their own benefit.

September Canada Monthly.

Why Canadians are neglecting the opportunities in their own country is the theme on which John H. Parry, the economic writer, preaches a sermon in September Canadian Monthly. When the American west was settled, the main thing was to get on. Men went to Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, broke the soil and sowed their crop and sold at twenty-five dollars an acre, thanking their stars for the deal they had made—only to see it double and treble and quadruple in value in the course of a few years. The same thing is going on in Western Canada, he says, and proceeds to explain how many Canadians who think they are doing well are really losing money.
