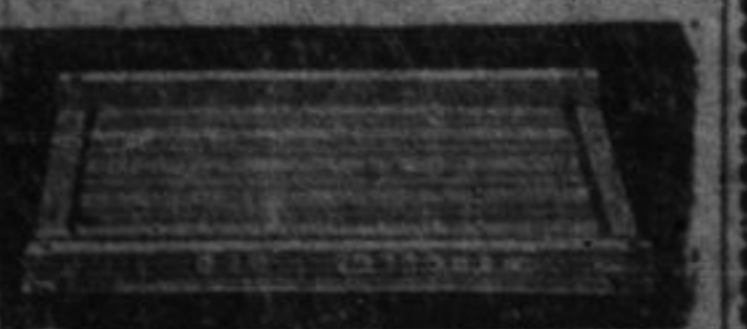

MCGILL AGAIN ENGAGES PROFESSIONAL RUGBY COACH.

Another Stanton's Rugby Scoring Idea is Unworkable—The National Hockey Union to Add Four Northern Clubs.

The Toronto Araks hope to have MacMurray, Arnold, Blinkley and Lawson out again with them.
Secretary Livingstone of the O.R.F.U. has written the Ottawa Rough Riders stating that if they wish to play in the O.R.F.U. this year they will have to post the \$500 bond by Thursday, or else be left out of the schedule.

Varsity will hold their initial practice of the season next Monday. It is expected that all of last year's players will be back, with the exception of Green, Haman and Harsard. Charley Gage, after an absence of a year, will also be back.

Ottawa will be represented in the Canadian baseball league next season, regardless of any changes that may be made in the circuit. Though the club was under a big expense this season, their railroad fares alone making an item of \$8,200, Business Manager Galatof saved the management will break ahead financially, and that there is no danger of the franchise not being extended in 1913.

AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT

MANY RUMORS CIRCULATED ABOUT THE R. & O. STOCK.

Gross Earnings so Far are in Excess of Those for the Same Period Last Year—Large Freight Earnings.

Toronto, Sept. 10.—Richelieu continues to attract the largest share of the Montreal and Toronto market at present and in the present attitude of suspicion created by the many rumors circulated within the last week or two, doubt has been thrown on the company's dividend, its ability to maintain its dividend, etc.

So far as Richelieu's earnings go it is stated, officially, that the combined companies to date show gross earnings in excess of those for the corresponding period last year. This result has been obtained notwithstanding the extraordinary bad weather for the summer which has seriously affected tourist travel and passenger earnings generally. Freight earnings, however, have been exceptionally large, more than making up for the decrease in the other direction.

Two factors have combined to larger freight earnings for Richelieu. One is the notable shortage of tonnage, which has kept all boats in the lake service working to capacity. A second is the higher rates. Rates at the present time are almost double what they were a year ago and before the close of the season with the movement of the winter crop to the seaboard, it is expected that they will actually be double what they were a year ago. General knowledge of the freight situation of the great lakes throughout the summer makes the statement as to the larger earnings entirely reasonable.

In the spring when Richelieu around 123 was regarded by most brokerage houses as one of the cheapest stocks on the list, it was generally understood that the position of the stock was adversely affected by a large block of stock overhanging the market. This block is now said to be almost completely liquidated. An ironic feature of the present situation would therefore appear to be that the sharp break in the stock has come when what seemed to be the chief obstacle to the stock's rise has been removed.

The combined Richelieu companies' net earnings last year were approximately eleven per cent. on the present capital of \$10,000,000. Although all the economies which will eventually be effected by the consolidation have not been carried out, enough has been done in this direction to warrant, with the increase in gross earnings this year, a better showing in respect to net.

La Rose Sold at 279.
Toronto, Sept. 10.—A recovery of four points in the price of La Rose which sold steadily at 279, and the continuation of the selling in Crown Chartered and Dome Extension constituted features in the mining market.

La Rose dropped to 275, the lowest price in its history, yesterday, under selling which emanated in Montreal, and which was believed to foreshadow the disposition of a portion at least of the big cash surplus of the company, which stands at the present time at something like \$1,700,000.

For some months the street has been anticipating an announcement, either of a bonus to stockholders or else of the acquisition of additional properties in Cobalt or adjacent mining districts. Whether Montreal has learned something of this kind, local brokers were ignorant or not remains to be seen; suffice to say that the liquidation came from the eastern centre, and was accepted as a precursor of something which would not meet with general approval.

In view of the recent action of several of the mining companies in acquiring additional territory for development without asking for a vote of the shareholders before making the purchase there is a general idea prevalent that any such action on the part of the La Rose directors will meet with considerable opposition from the shareholders.

May Build New Plant in West.
Fort William, Ont., Sept. 10.—The announcement was made in Fort William, Saturday night, by prominent officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway that the Steel company of Canada were negotiating with the Grand Trunk Pacific for a site in Port William on which to erect a big steel plant to be located on the south side of the Mission river between the plants of the Seaman Kent company and the Imperial Oil company.

Financial Notes.
At the special meeting of United Fruit stockholders at Jersey City, unanimous approval was given to an increase in capital stock from \$35,000,000 to \$45,000,000.

The pineapple pack of Hawaii this season is estimated at 1,000,000 cases of twenty-four tins each, while the out-

put of "pineectar" is 100,000 gallons. Owing to the pressure of personal business obligations, Sir Rodolphe Forget, M.P., will retire as a director of the Aygnacque Pulp and Paper company, which action it is said will be followed shortly by Sir Rodolphe's withdrawal from several other important directorates.

This year's honey crop will be less than half that of last year, according to reliable advices from county by places. There is practically no white clover honey on the market, as clover faded badly this spring, but light yellow honey is on sale to grocers at from eleven to twelve cents a pound.

At Chicago, transportation in the all-important problem in grain and flour. Ocean freight rates advanced almost daily and room is scarce for nearly forwarding points and growing more so daily for deferred shipments. Lake freight rates are nearly up to the all-rail basis. Heavy demand for ore carriers is taking a great many boats out of grain carrying.

A door has been placed in the rear of the Methodist church. Many attended the Brockville fair last week. The public school opened last Tuesday with the same teachers.
