The full wedding veil was gracefully draped and was fastened by sprays of orange blossoms. Miss Edith Fraser wore a gown of pale rose cascade silk, with coat of points de venise lace, and trimmed with touches of velvet. A black picture hat, faced with rose panne velvet, and trimmed with bandeau of black feathers, completed a very charming picture.

NEW ROLLER ON THE JOB.

City Now in a Position to do Their Own Asphaltic Paving.

The new steam roller was on Barrie street on Wednesday morning. Ten Eyck, the travelling mechanic of the Buffalo Steam Roller company, is on hand as a demonstrator. Everything is ready to begin the work of paving except the weather. The rain on Wednesday night held up the work, as it must be laid on a perfectly dry road. A. T. Goodnow, the paving expert, is also on the job.

The roller is entirely different than any of the old type. It has two large flat-rolling cylinders and the boiler and engine are set low between them so that everything is quite handy to be got at for cleaning and repairs. The roller is equipped with a power steering device and weighs eight tons over all. The city is now in a position to proceed with the asphalt pavements on the least travelled streets and lay them on their own methods as they have done the sidewalks.
