**LICENSE INSPECTORS MADE HAUL ON SATURDAY.**

Joseph McConnell and Charles Frallick Will be Charged With Having Liquor on Their Premises—Inspectors Had Dray Load of "Strong Stuff."

As the result of a visit made by Provincial License Inspector Morrison, accompanied by County Inspector Moreland, and City Inspector Wright, on Saturday afternoon, quite a large quantity of beer and liquor was confiscated, and Joseph McConnell, of Williamsville, and Charles F. Frallick, of the Driving Park hotel, have been summoned to appear before Justice of the Peace Hunter and Bradshaw, on a charge of having liquor on their premises, they having no license to sell. The case will be heard at the court house on Wednesday afternoon.

The inspectors made their visit very quietly on Saturday afternoon, and a dray had to be secured to carry off the supply of "wet goods" they unearthed. Their first visit was made to McConnell's place, and it is stated that here they secured thirty-three cases of beer, in addition to a quantity of stronger drink. Inspector Wright remained on guard over this, while the other two inspectors made the trip out to Frallick's, where a most substantial increase was made to their supply. Afterwards a dray was secured to haul the "cargo" away. It was removed to a suitable place, to await the hearing of the case.

**BY TRAILING A GIRL**

**Detectives Captured Chief of the Allen Clan.**  
Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 16.—By trailing Miss Maul, Iroquois, aged eighteen, a mountain girl, who arrived here Saturday, from Hillsville, Va., to marry Wesley Edwards, one of Hillsville's court room lawyers, detectives captured Sidna Allen, chief of the Allen gang, and expect to capture Wesley Edwards.

Detectives Baldwin, Lucar and Monday, who have been on the trail of the Allen since their escape after the tragedy in the Virginia court room, which cost the lives of Judge Mason and several others, had the Iroquois girl watched and soon discovered she was corresponding with some one in the west. A few days ago she prepared for a journey and detectives followed her here and there after she entered the boarding-house where Allen and Edwards were stopping.

They arrested Allen, who paid no attention to the officers when they entered the building, but when they told him to throw up his hands, he tried to draw a revolver, but was disarmed. He admitted his identity and broke down and sobbed.

The officers then started after Edwards, who was at work with a grading gang.

Miss Maul says she came here to marry Edwards and that they have been sweethearts for years.

**A DEAD MAN REVIVED**

**A WINNIPEG DOCTOR PRO-NOUNCED LIFE EXTINCT.**  
Police Inspector Later Detected Signs of Vitality, and the Man Was Saved From Being Buried Alive.

Winnipeg, Sept. 16.—Pro-nounced dead by a qualified physician, laid out in his house while authority was being sought from the coroner to bury him without inquest, resuscitated by another physician, after a police inspector had suspected a spark of life and to-day walking about the streets of Winnipeg is the strange experience of S. Musick. Had it not been for a series of accidents, Musick would have been buried alive.

Musick was found, apparently dead, in his bed and after an examination Dr. Knight pronounced life extinct. The coroner, however, was not satisfied with the story that reached him and possibly suspected foul play. He sent Inspector Macdonald with a constable to get evidence. While watching the body, the officer thought he detected a slight movement of the blankets. On this being reported Dr. Bercovitich was summoned and made an examination.

All the usual tests showed entire absence of reflex action of muscles and breathing. Suspecting the man might be suffering from cranial pressure, causing what is known as chestnuts, or suspended breathing, the physician drew off some blood serum from the spinal canal, with the result that reflex action returned and the man was soon on his feet.
