TOWN OF GANANOQUE

A BENEFIT CONCERT GIVEN FOR A PARALYTIC.

Hugh Davis Had His Foot Broken as the Result of a Fall in a Factory—Dredging of Gananoque River About Finished.

Gananoque, Sept. 17.—A benefit concert was held in the opera house in aid of Hugh McFadden, who was stricken with paralysis upwards of a year ago and who has since had two other strokes. The following local talent contributed to the excellent programme: the Citizens' band, who rendered some selections in front of the Opera House as well as within; St. Andrew's male quartette, consisting of Messrs. O. A. Meredith, T. E. Shields, Chas. Stephenson, William D. Cotton; the Misses Kate and Trena Brennan, Clifford Sine, William Runnett and A. F. Running. The concert was well patronized by the citizens. Rev. Melvin Taylor acted as chairman. Hugh Davis, an employee of the Parmenter & Bulloch Co. met with a painful accident on Monday afternoon. While on a ladder putting on a belt in the company's works, the belt caught and pulled the machine in, striking the ladder on which he stood, and throwing him to the cement floor below, where he fortunately landed on his feet. Medical aid was at once summoned when it was found that some of the small bones of one foot were broken.

West Leeds teachers' Institute meeting will be held in the assembly rooms of Gananoque High School on October 11th and 12th. Mrs. William Lefever, who has been spending several weeks here with her mother, Mrs. J. J. Moore, returned Monday from a short visit with relatives in Montreal, and left yesterday for her home in Winnipeg.

The work of dredging the Gananoque river up to the lower dam, so as to enable vessels of deep draught to come up to the factories along the river, will, it is expected, be completed next week.

Trouble Over Mine.

Toronto, Sept. 17.—The action of certain shareholders of the Crown Charter Mining Company in issuing a writ to prevent the directors disposing of certain assets of the company to shareholders residing in Rochester, New York, had a detrimental effect on the stock on the mining exchange, causing the bid price to drop from six to three cents. No sales were recorded at this figure however.

The directors of the company claim to have advanced certain moneys to the company, and the shareholders who have issued the writ claim that they know of no such advances.

The property in question is situated in Porcupine Camp, and is claimed by the shareholders to be their most valuable asset.

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ANOTHER FIGHT ON

NEED NOT LOOK FOR PARTITION OF AMAL. COPPER.

Mine in Porcupine in Dispute—Unfortunate Blunders Made by the Politicians.

Boston, Sept. 17.—Those who have been looking for the dissolution of the Amalgamated Copper Co. in the near future, will be disappointed. At the present time the management has no such intentions, nor has the subject been officially touched upon at directors' meetings.

From time to time the 'Street' has had various reasons to offer as to why Amalgamated should dissolve, the chief contention being that the company's sole duty of late had been the custody of Anaconda's control through stock ownership. To this the reply is made that Amalgamated has many other functions.

Since the realignment of the Butte camp under control of the Anaconda Co. and the acquisition of the entire capital-stock of the United Metals Co., Amalgamated has become responsible for the sale of more copper metal annually than any other individual agency in the world. Sales of about half a billion pounds of copper a year may now be considered the company's most important function. Based upon the Selling Co's disbursements to former stockholders, Amalgamated will receive at least \$1,000,000 per annum from this source alone.

The official answer to statements that dissolution might be attempted, is, therefore, that Amalgamated's interests are still sufficiently diversified and large to warrant the maintenance of its corporate existence.

UNFORTUNATE BLUNDERS.

New York, Sept. 17.—One thing that makes Wall Street a bit nervous over the political situation is the unfortunate blunders being made by leading orators in discussing vital issues. The meat test, for instance, is no doubt a monster that ought to be strangled, but the plain fact is that there are fewer edible animals in the United States now than perhaps in any year.

Official records of the government tabulated last year show that in ten years there was a decrease of more than 6,000,000 in the number of all cattle and of more than 9,000,000 in the number of sheep.

PRODUCTION OF GOLD.

For the first six months of the year the gold production of the province, according to the report of the bureau of mines, was 11,854 ounces, valued at \$225,198, an increase of \$192,878. This is chiefly from the Dome Mine, since since the six months ended, the Hollinger mill began turning out gold and there are now a number of small producers as well.

FINANCIAL NOTES.

The United States attorney general says that American Telegraph and Telephone is under investigation, but would not indicate whether a dissolution suit would be filed.

Last year on the British railways only one passenger was injured out of every 480,000 passengers carried. And yet American railroad men scornfully regard English railroad management as behind the times.

It is not generally known that the muskrat is the most important fur-bearing animal in North America. In one year alone (1910) 5,500,000 muskrat skins were put upon the market, realizing to the trappers a sum approximately of \$1,700,000.

A. E. Oster has been elected a member of the Toronto Stock Exchange. Mr. Oster, who bought a seat from Sir Henry Pellatt, is the second member of the Standard to go on the "big board" in recent years. Orlando Heron made the change a couple of years ago.

Reports are current that negotiations have been opened for the absorption of Inspiration Copper, Green Cananea Copper, and Miami Copper by the Anaconda Copper interests. Interests identified with those properties say that if such a merger plan is under way they are not aware of the fact.

MOST WHITE SLAVES

ARE FOUND TO BE SMALL AND DARK.

Eighty Per Cent. in Chicago's Vice District are Brunettes—Low Wages One Cause of Girls' Downfall.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—The Chicago Protective League for Women, which is conducted by civic leaders, both men and women, and which has for its object the suppression of white slave traffic, has just given out some curious statistics.

The league has 700 women in the segregated district booked and card indexed.

"From the records," says the secretary, "we find that eighty per cent of the women have dark brown hair and dark eyes. This indicates, perhaps susceptibility of brunettes to the wiles and false promises of men. The majority are small women—small in stature and weight. More than one-third of them are married. Many are twenty-four, but the majority say they made their first misstep between sixteen and seventeen, but did not take up the life regularly until twenty years.

"Fully ninety per cent say the small wages—\$5 and \$6 a week forced the life on them. Many are supporting mothers and educating brothers and sisters. About ten per cent are married.

"Fifteen were school teachers and twenty have attended college. But few were found who could not read and write. Many are well educated and read the best literature.

"We expect to register fully 2,500 women and we have the assistance of the police, who register women, but do not go into details. We are trying to discover the cause of vice so that we can most successfully fight it. Five girls were prevented from entering the district last week. Two were under age and three were found whose relatives had reported them to the police as 'lost.' Dance halls mentioned frequently as contributing causes to downfall.

"The startling fact was discovered that only twenty per cent had been on the downward path more than four years. More than half the histories showed but a year or two. The women made affidavits to their life story. We found three who came from families of millionaires and one a cousin, the wife, of a namesake of a prominent United States senator mentioned frequently in the newspapers as involved with large corporations.
