REGRETS THE PASSING. Of the Sailing Skills on the St. Lawrence River.

Commenting on the passing of skill sailing and the substitution of motor boats, as the result of an aquatic sport, Right Wing, of the New York Sun, says: The motor boat has played havoc with certain kinds of small boat sailing. Especially has it made inroads on the old St. Lawrence

skill. I do not know what has become of the St. Lawrence and the Akake, two of the most beautiful samples of the boat builder's art the eye could look upon. It is a fair guess that they have gone to the scrap heap. The old racing boat was so heavily sparred that they could not stand up alone in the water, and it took a crew of four men pretty well packed in the small cockpit, to handle them in heavy weather.

They carried something like 450 square feet of canvas in two bay wing sails, and they could sail every lastingly close to the wind. They were especially suited to the St. Lawrence because of the many tricky currents and odd shifts of wind that prevail there, and it was often possible in windward work to catch a gust around an island that allowed the craft to split the current. Properly handled, these boats were faster than catboats with a larger sail spread.

But the sport seems to be dead as far as I can learn, even at Kingston and Brockville, nor do the beautiful batwing put forth any longer from quiet old Gananoque. I know of no better school for the small boat sailor than the single-masted St. Lawrence skiff, which has not yet quite gone out of existence. These boats are sailed without a rudder, the skipper using the sheet, the centreboard and a shift of weight in the boat. Obviously they are the best of craft in which to learn "the feel of the boat," and I sincerely hope that interest in them will be revived some day.

One of the motor boats which turned over and sank the other day off Huntington was built by Leyerre, one of the old time St. Lawrence boat builders who years ago would have turned up his nose at an order to build anything but a sailing craft. It was many a long day before he would undertake a steam yacht, and from this he passed through the houseboat stage and so on to the motor boat. It was another Leyerre who built one of the most famous houseboats that was ever towed on the St. Lawrence and up through the Rideau. She had a hull like an ocean-going yacht, and when she went into a lock before the wind and her amateur crew tried to snub her something had to give. I do not know what has become of her, but she was a marvel of the boat-builder's art.
