THE LATE ROBERT GATES.
Who Lost His Life by an Accident at Iroquois.

A young deckhand named Robert Gates, employed on the steamer Alexandria, received fatal injuries at the Iroquois dock, while the boat was making her regular westward passage Friday. In the performance of his duties he was handling a hawser, as the craft was making a landing, and in some manner his left leg was caught between the rope and the pulling post. Under the heavy pressure the log was torn almost completely off close to the body before the unfortunate man could be released.

Dr. Johnson, of Iroquois, temporarily dressed the injury, then hurried the patient to the Brockville General hospital in his automobile, a distance of twenty-seven miles. Gates stood the journey with remarkable pluck. On King street east the motor car halted about 5.30 o'clock in the afternoon in the family plot.
