CHARGE DISMISSED

CASE AGAINST FAIR DIRECTORS FELL FLAT.

Complainant Did Not Appear Against Township Agricultural Society—Two Directors Pleaded "Not Guilty" When Charge Was Read—Aged Woman Complainant in Another Case.

The charge against the directors of the Kingston Township fair—that of illegally conducted horse races at their count fair, while receiving a grant from the government—fell flat in police court, on Thursday morning. When the case was called, the complainant, Thomas Sheehan, failed to put in an appearance, and Magistrate Farrell dismissed the charge.
Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P., and James L. F. Sproule, two of the directors, appeared, and when arraigned on the charge, entered a plea of "not guilty."

The complainant in a non-payment of wages case, Mrs. Mary Doherty, gave her age as eighty-four. D. A. Givens appeared for her. She claimed wages amounting to \$14, from one Mary Brown. E. G. McMillan appeared on behalf of Mrs. Brown, who claimed that she did not complain anything. Mrs. Doherty was an inmate of the House of Industry for some time, but on February 13th last, went to live with Mrs. Brown, and remained there until March 17th. She claimed that she did a great deal of housework, and was entitled to money, but Mrs. Brown declared that there was no agreement made for wages. After considering all the evidence, the magistrate allowed her \$3.
Thomas Driston was fined \$3 and costs, or twenty days, for being drunk. He was given a chance, on Wednesday, but did not take advantage of it.

LITTLE BOY WAS LOST

And Farmer Brought Him to the Police Station.
"I want to go home," cried a chubby little chap, at the police station, at noon, to-day.

The youngster, about six years of age, wandered away from his home, and was found near the corner of Queen and Montreal streets, by a farmer. The lad did not like the idea of staying in the station at night, but soon as he became acquainted with the constables, he made himself very much at home. After he had been in the station about an hour, the telephone rang, and the person speaking was making anxious inquiries about Harry, for that was his name. He was soon at his home.

"B" BATTERY TRANSFERRED

To Artillery Park Barracks Since its Return Home.

N. S. Leslie, officer commanding, will, when the renovations are completed at Fort de Pont barracks, be in good quarters. Being alongside the water, is some compensation.

THE KINGSTON PRESBYTERY.

Rev. Prof. Laird's Report On Systematic Giving.

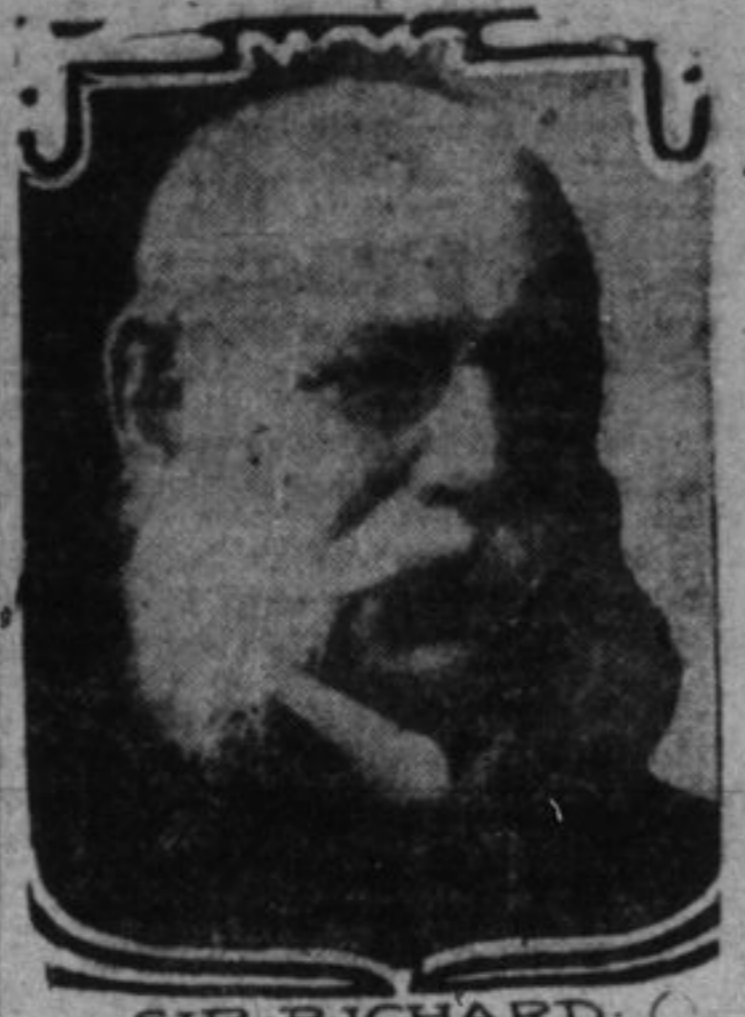
At the Kingston Presbytery meeting at Belleville, Rev. A. H. Drumm was reappointed moderator until June next. The congregations of Lansdowne and Morris were put on the augmented list for grants at the rate of \$50 per annum to bring them up to the new minimum of \$900.

Rev. Prof. Laird of Kingston gave a comprehensive address and report in reference to systematic giving. The report showed that in 1900 there were 5,482 communicants in the presbytery and \$2,873 was contributed for church schemes. In 1910 there were 6,173 communicants and \$6,980 was contributed. In 1911 there were 6,605 communicants and \$8,151 was contributed. The allotment for all church purposes at the presbytery for 1913 amounts to \$14,000.

The installation and induction of Rev. Dr. Morgan, the new professor of systematic theology in Queen's, was left in the hands of Rev. Dr. Ross.
