MEN WERE DISLOYAL

SEVEN COMMITTEEMEN READ OUT OF THE PARTY.

Action Without Precedent—Never Before Has Committee Tried Any Member for Heresy—Vote to Expel Unanimous.

New York, Sept. 19.—By unprecedented but unanimous action the republican national committee, sitting as a trial court in the Hotel Manhattan, yesterday, ousted seven of its members for heresy and disloyalty to President Taft. Of the forty-eight members of the committee forty-one were present or were represented by proxies. All voted to expel the accused members.

The hearing was held behind closed doors, and Chairman Hilles announced that the committee had accepted the resignations of the members from Ohio, Oklahoma and Minnesota and had declared vacant the seats of four others. Those who were unseated are: Boris D. Whiting of New Jersey, who had refused to resign. He will be succeeded by Franklin Murphy, former governor.

William J. Edwards, of West Virginia, who is working hard for Roosevelt and who had refused to resign. He will be succeeded by former United States Senator Nathan Scott.

Richardson Pearson, of North Carolina, recently declared disloyal by the North Carolina republican state convention. His successor is to be E. C. Duncan, a former senator.

Those who resigned are: Walter F. Brown, of Ohio, whose place is to go to Sherman Granger; C. C. Priestly, a bull moose, of Oklahoma; J. A. Caswell, of Minnesota. Never before has a national committee found it necessary to try any of its members for heresy and disloyalty.

SALARY ATTACHED FOR YEARS.

—Must Serve Eleven in Jail—Creditors' Outlook Blue.

Dresden, Sept. 19.—Walter Snell who was at one time Germany's vice-consul at Chicago and later a provincial court counselor in Saxony, was sentenced to eleven years and six months imprisonment for obtaining money under false pretences.

Snell's annual salary was 4,800 marks, or about \$1,200. He accumulated debts of fifty thousand marks, or \$12,500. The defence to the charge of obtaining loans which he could not possibly pay, as his salary had been legally attached for the coming sixteen years, was that he expected to marry a rich U.S. woman, who had planned to get a divorce, but her husband became bankrupt before the scheme could be carried out.

The woman's name was not divulged.

WILL BE NO OBJECT

IN FIGHTING WHEN AIRSHIP IS EFFICIENT.

War Will be Rendered Ineffective—Peace Advocates are Delighted at This Pacifying Influence.

Paris, Sept. 19.—Does the increasing efficiency of the airship mean that war on sea and land between the great powers will be made so ineffective that neither side can make progress, and therefore, there is no object in fighting. Some of the big morning papers of Paris to-day assert this is the case. They call attention to the fact that the military manoeuvres in both France and England this year were completely nullified of results because rival aviator scouts made it so easy to discover the enemy's movements that nothing could be done. Peace advocates here are delighted at this unexpected pacifying influence among nations.
