THE BISON'S ASYLUM

WAINRIGHT PARK IS HOME OF THE LAST BIG HERD.

The Majestic Animal Which Roamed the Prairies in Countless Herds a Generation Ago is Now the Subject of Zoological Experts—May Kept for Emergencies.

To see him in the cramped paddock of some city "zoo," with his wicked little eyes looking out sullenly from under a vast mat of dingy hair in which he hardly appears a subject for romance.

But if we go back a few years—a very few years—and transport ourselves to our own great plains, where the railway and the steam plow and multitude of newcomers from west and east and south are turning the ancient sod and cutting the prairies into wheat-fields, we shall find the buffalo a favorite with romance.

Happily, romance stepped in to avert the expected doom. In other words, the "conservation" idea seized the imagination of the people, and the buffalo found protectors in the Governments of the United States and Canada.

The park comprises about five townships, and extends from Hardisty, on the Edmonton and Saskatoon branch of the Canadian Pacific, to Wainwright, a divisional point on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

The park was prepared for the reception of the buffaloes by enclosing with a fence of strong steel wire ten feet high and 75 miles long, costing a thousand dollars a mile.

Within the vast enclosure pasture is always abundant, but, lest at any time a great snowfall should bury it too deep, there is always on hand a plentiful supply of hay for the whole herd, which consists of 850 animals brought from Montana, a whole lot of 50 collected from other places and a number of young animals born in the park.
