Diverse Types In India.

The people of India who inhabit the immense plains of Ganges and Indus, from Calcutta to Peshawur, are of Aryan origin, but display many diversities of type, due partly to environment and partly to the widely differing periods of their residence in the country. The acute but timid Bengali of to-day resembles little the warlike Sikh of the Punjab, or the fierce Afghan of Rochileund; and the patient weaver of Dacca is wholly unlike the high-spirited Rajput of central India.

Differences in the stature of the various tribes may be accounted for similarly. Equally courageous and fierce in battle, the short sturdy Goorka from the mountains of Nepal lacks many inches of the stalwart
