OTTAWA COLLEGE WILL HAVE SYLVESTER QUILTY.

A Hamilton Trainer to be Engaged for Queen's Rugby Team—Stewart Robertson Decides to Play With the Ottawas.

A despatch from Ottawa says:—"Queen's will have to come up against Sylvester Quilty in their initial match with Ottawa College. He has registered here, causing much joy among the students."

"Stewart Robertson, the former Kingston half back, who did splendid work for the Ottawas behind the line last season, and who threatened to retire because of parental objections, was among those present on Saturday. Robertson will be available all fall, and will play centre half in the event of Jack Williams remaining obstinate."

To Engage Trainer.

The athletic committee at Queen's is to meet this afternoon to decide about engaging Whitmore, of Hamilton, as a mariner for the senior rugby team.

Queen's Not Ready To Play.

The management of Queen's rugby team received a telegram from a Toronto team on Monday morning asking for a game here on Saturday afternoon. As Queen's is not in condition to play, it was decided not to accede to the request.

Saturday's Dinky Race.

Douglas Anglin took first place in the dinky race, for the Flora trophy, sailed at the yacht club, on Saturday afternoon. The race was the most keenly contested and interesting of the season, and a large number of spectators were on hand. W. Nickle, according to time, came second, and A. Brown third. It appears that Anglin fouled Nickle in rounding one of the buoys, and the regatta committee will decide, the winner. The start was made at 3.30 o'clock, with a good breeze blowing.

The time at the finish was: Anglin, 4.31.45; Nickle, 4.32.6; Brown, 4.32.10.

If Anglin is upheld by the committee, the standing of the leader or the trophy will not be affected.

No Free Tuition Offered.

Queen's received a slap from the Ottawa Citizen on Saturday to the effect that it had tried to secure the services of Sylvester Quilty, the former captain of the Ottawa College outfit, for its rugby team this fall. Free tuition was alleged to be the bait offered.

The manager of Queen's team wishes to refute any such thing being offered by the management. The offering of free tuition was not extended to Quilty and no bait of such manner is thrown to prospective rugbyists from the Kingston university.

A HOME BEREAVED.

Death of Little Daughter of C. N. Meserve.

The home and circle of friends of C. N. Meserve, general secretary of the Y.M.C.A., and Mrs. Meserve, Frontenac street, has been saddened by the death of their nine-year-old and only daughter, Ruth, who had not been in her usual good health for about three weeks, passed away in the general hospital, on Sunday night, from diabetes.

Ruth's illness showed serious symptoms on Tuesday last. She was operated on in the general hospital, for appendicitis, on Thursday morning, and diabetes was also discovered. Since then she lay in an unconscious condition, and her parents were in constant attendance. Little hope was held out for her recovery since the operation.

The bereaved father, in his official position, and his wife, have been for themselves a large number of friends since coming to the city last March, and the deep sympathy of these is extended to them in the passing away of their little girl. She was born in Clifton Springs, N.Y., and leaves two brothers, Mrs. Meserve's mother residing with her.

The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon, at Princess Street Methodist church, the service to be conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. G. Robinson. The deceased little girl was a member of Miss M. Adair's class in the Sunday school. The remains will be taken over on the five o'clock steamer, to Rochester, N.Y., where interment will be made.

AT ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.

Bishop Mills Preached Thoughtful and Helpful Sermon.

There was a large congregation in St. Paul's church Sunday evening. The service was a very impressive one, and, indeed, this always impresses the visitor to St. Paul's. The sermon was good and deeply spiritual in tone.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

Bulgaria and Macedonia are expected at any moment to rise and throw off the Turkish yoke.

Frank Smith, of Texas, was convicted in Belleville of shop-breaking and sentenced to penitentiary for five years.

The Niagara pleasure steamer, Maid of the Mist went on the rocks, but succeeded in reaching the landing stage without any serious mishap.

Inspector William McCammon, acting for the board of health, is investigating about a dozen cases of unsanitary conditions, around the city. A few cases are still pending in the police court. A case against a Williamsville butcher who is charged with keeping his premises in an unsanitary condition, was to have come before Magistrate Farrell Monday morning, but has been put off until Wednesday.

Marine Notes.

The rough weather of to-day prevented several vessels from clearing, and many on the route had to seek shelter.

M. T. Co.'s elevator: Steamer Acadian, from Fort William, discharged 72,000 bushels of wheat, and cleared for Belleville, to load cement for Fort William; tug Bartlett, from Port Dalhousie, with two grain-laden barges in tow, from Port Colborne; tug Emerson, from Montreal; three light barges, will clear for Montreal with three grain barges; tug Bartlett will clear for Port Colborne, with two barges to load grain; steamer Kenora, grain-laden, from Fort William, due to arrive to-night to discharge; steamer Turret Chief, grain-laden, from Fort William, due to arrive on Tuesday morning.

Threshing Impossible.

Winnipeg, Sept. 23.—The soaking of Thursday and Friday and part of Saturday have been followed all over the west by cold, cloudy days and heavy frosts at night, with the result that threshing is once more impossible in a majority of districts from Winnipeg to Calgary. In many places it cannot be resumed until next day, as the stalks are thoroughly soaked.

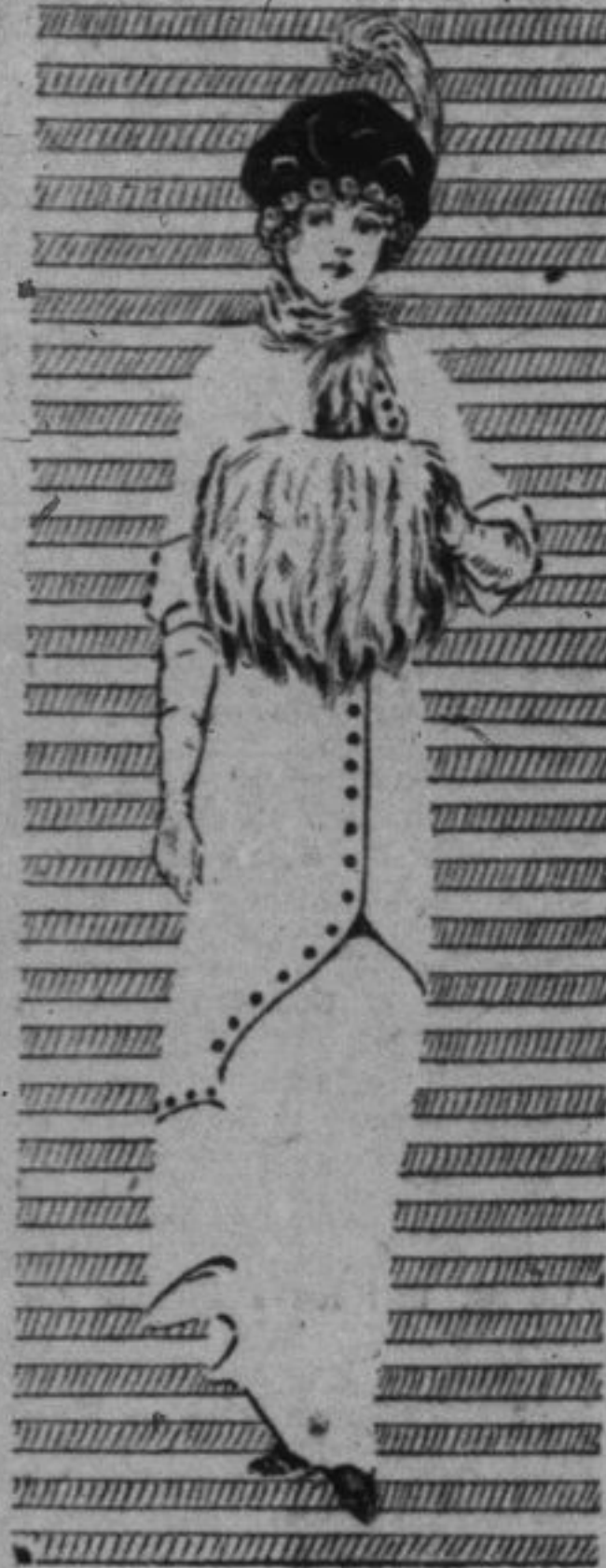

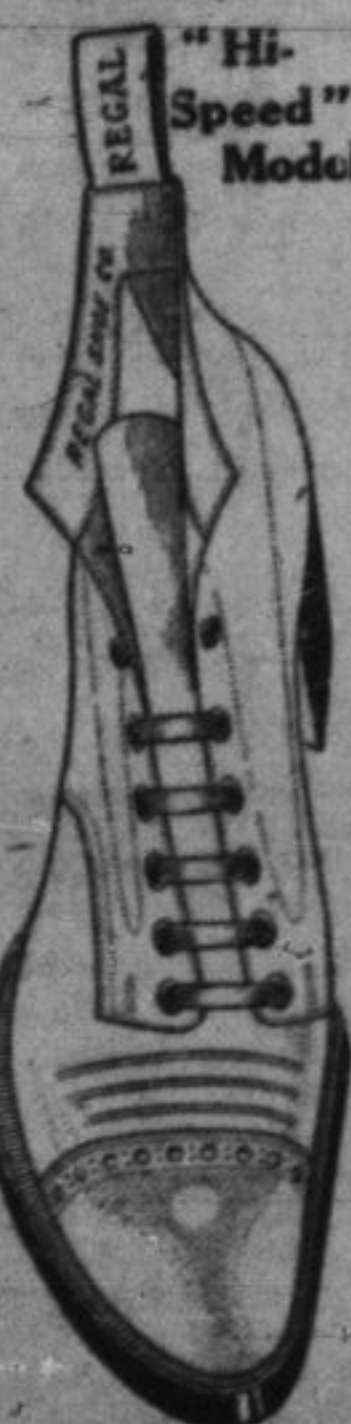
The Late Stanley Genge.
