TWO MAY ARRANGE

AN ALLIANCE OF VERY GREAT STRENGTH.

The Biggest Car Shortage Ever Known in the United States—Short Term Financing is Now the Vogue.

Calgary, Sept. 23.—A local paper says: "Canadians will wake up some morning in the near future with the news of two of the greatest railroad alliances that have ever been formed and one of these alliances will make the Canadian Pacific railroad the strongest in the world, according to rumors now floating around in railroad circles."

"Behind the rumors in a story of the invasion of Canada by American roads, and the story going around is that the Great Northern road, already into Portage la Prairie and Brandon and heading for Regina, contemplates coming through Manitoba and Saskatchewan, heading up with the Grand Trunk Pacific and at the same time coming from the Montana boundary line into Alberta and meeting with the G.T.P. in this province, practically by networking Western Canada with branch roads and trunk lines."

"To offset this the Canadian Pacific and the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul roads are contemplating an alliance, and although it will not be an amalgamation, they will work together and invade the Jim Hill territory in the United States, part of which is already invaded by the C. M. & St. Paul, together making the strongest combination in the world."

Faces Big Car Shortage.

New York, Sept. 23.—The United States is apparently face to face with the greatest car shortage in its history. A shortage of 179,838 cars by October 25th, provided only that the amount of traffic handled in 1909 is furnished this year, is estimated in a warning bulletin issued by W. A. Garrison, chairman of the Association of Western Railways.

roads is declared to be in sight already, a western grain crop breaking at previous records, and a sudden boom in all branches of business combining to put an unprecedented strain upon transportation facilities. This would largely increase the estimate of shortages.

Appeals to shippers to make the utmost use of every available car are being sent out broadcast by the railroads. One railroad has issued a warning within a fortnight to many of its customers that they would better do what shipping they can in the next sixty days, as the prospects are that the road will not be able to furnish cars by the end of October.

Broker Falls in London.

London, Sept. 23.—Announcement was made on the Stock Exchange today, of the suspension of John Goff Spence, who has been a member of the Exchange since 1873. The broker has been doing a fairly large business.

Short Term Financing.

Montreal, Sept. 22.—An increased tendency towards short term financing has marked the municipal market during the past month, says the Dominion Bond company. In fact, this tendency and an indication of what will undoubtedly prove to become a general concession to the demand for a higher yield on this class of security are the outstanding features of the market.

Short-term financing seems to be the only present remedy for relieving the congestion of the municipal market, which is slight at home, but which continues somewhat serious abroad. This method of raising money for present needs if continued for a fair period will give the market a chance to strike its proper level.

Commercial Notes.

The period of grace for paying interest on East Canada bond coupons extends until Dec. 1st, on which date the bondholders may, if they see fit, take action.

The Cobalt Aladdin company, limited, has taken a lease of the old Silver Queen mine, at Cobalt, which has been closed down since 1909, and are actively engaged getting it ready for mining operations.

Laurentide attracted much attention on the local market Friday morning, the price moving up around 216 to 220 in a very short time. The street is convinced that the recent strength is due to knowledge in certain quarters that there will be rights for Laurentide shareholders before long.

Trade of all kinds is booming all over Quebec. The warehouses are working overtime to keep up with numerous requests for fall orders. Foot and shoe manufacturers are satisfied with orders, notwithstanding advance in price of leather. A light failure in it is reported, only five in solvency being listed with liabilities of \$21,000.

There is considerable agitation owing to the decline of Mackay stocks. The selling is regarded as only temporary and it is feared the earnings of the company will be impaired by the recent reductions in telegraph and cable rates.

The Russell Motor Locomotive Co. has recently completed the installation of additional machinery, at a cost of \$100,000.

The new Canadian plant of the National Car company has orders from the Canadian Northern and Canadian Pacific that will keep it busy to the spring of 1913.

The Cocksfoot Plow company, of Brantford, show net profits of \$848,274.12 for the year ending June 30th, 1912.

The earnings of the International Nickel company, New York, for the first five months of the current year, are slightly better than last year, and exceed the prospect of a high record for 1912-13. It has in mind the listing of its stock on the stock exchange, but the matter is being approached slowly.

Samuel Hale, of Wisconsin Street company, has been appointed general manager of the Lake Superior Coal portation, at the Soo, to take effect Oct. 1st.

THINKS WILSON WILL WIN.

In Letter Acknowledges Probable Victory of Democrats. London, Sept. 23.—Theodore Roosevelt has not much to say, if any, hope of winning the presidential fight, judging by the tone of letters received by personal friends here. He wrote to one correspondent, recalling Kermit's remark to the effect that "Daddy was praying for Champ." Had Champ Clark received the nomination, he thought he might have had a good chance, but with a man like Governor Wilson holding the democratic vote he had no hope of obtaining a majority of the electors.

FACTORY WILL BE IDLE THE SPORT REVIEW

FOR TWO MONTHS OWING TO SERIOUS FIRE.

Dredging to Continue at Gananoque—The Corner Stone of the Gananoque Post Office Was Not Laid on the "Glorious 21st."

Gananoque, Sept. 23.—About 5.45 o'clock Saturday morning, the employees of the Gananoque Water Power company, while opening the gates at the dam, noticed smoke rising from the upper windows of the works of the St. Lawrence Steel and Wire company. Chief Smith and his brigade were promptly on the job. The fire was in the main building and started back near the boiler room, presumably catching from there. Three streams were quickly turned on and inch by inch the fire was forced back until the appliances of the Ontario Wheel company were brought into play, and this soon turned the tide. The building is of stone and owned by Justice B. M. Britton, of Toronto, and is well insured. The loss has been variously estimated at from eight to ten thousand dollars but will probably be over the latter amount. The walls are all right, floor and roof are badly burned. The machinery is considerably damaged and the belting entirely. This will mean at least a month or six weeks enforced idleness of the employees, and the work of repairing will be started as soon as the insurance appraisers have settled the amount of damages.

The government dredge, operated by the Randolph, McDonald Co., which has been dredging the St. Lawrence and Gananoque rivers in this section for the past six weeks, received orders to leave on Saturday, but as the work could not be left in the shape it then was, the little factory town got busy and soon had a statement of existing conditions with the department at Ottawa. The work, which was stopped during the morning, was resumed about the middle of the afternoon, and will doubtless be finished before the dredge is removed. The dredge force are up to within a few hundred feet of the lower dam.

R. E. Cook, Ottawa, son of Mr. S. G. Cook, night clerk at the local post office, has been appointed assistant superintendent of printing in the government printing bureau at Ottawa.

DIES BY WIFE'S FALSE TEETH

Widower Asked that Nemento be Buried With Him. St. Louis, Sept. 23.—Carefully arranging for his death for days in advance, Frederick Koerig, sixty-five years old, swallowed carbolic acid this morning, and died at the city hospital.

While his unconscious form was the false teeth which had belonged to his wife, who died last June. A note asked that these teeth and the ashes of his wife be buried with him in the new St. Marys cemetery; also her picture, his eyeglasses and his citizenship papers. He left a note saying he was unmercifully wronged by his wife.

A letter to Koerig's daughter-in-law contained the price quoted to him for the various services connected with a funeral of moderate cost. He left a cheque for \$54 made out to an undertaking firm.

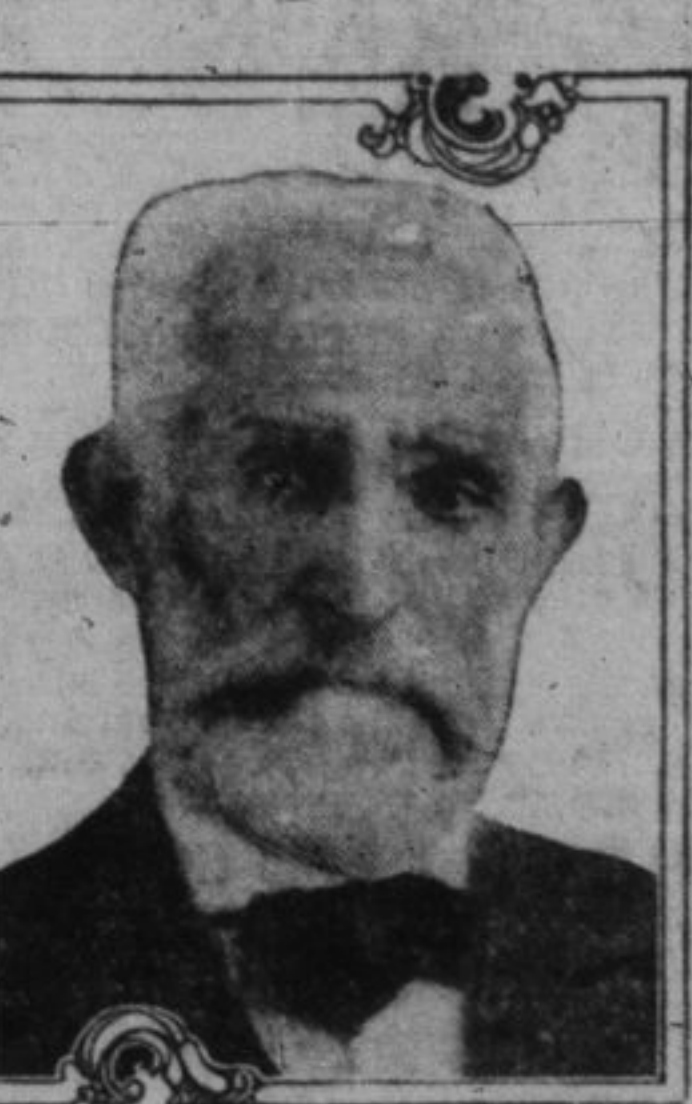
The British Olympic council is preliminary report attributed the failure of the English representatives at Stockholm, in a great measure to the apathy of the British people.
