NOT TO PUBLISH

The Assessment Roll of the City

MOTION VOTED DOWN

BY THE CITY COUNCIL ON MONDAY EVENING.

The Aldermen Did Not Think the Roll Could be Remedied by Its Publication — Aids, Turkington and Stroud Alone Voted Yea.

A motion of Aids, Turkington and Stroud, to have the assessment roll published, for the benefit of taxpayers, was defeated by the city council on Monday night, the mover and seconder of the motion alone voting "yea" and a motion of Aids, Ross and Rigney, and the matter referred to the finance committee, for consideration, the committee to report to council at the earliest possible date, was passed.

Practically the entire council was favorable to having the assessment roll rounded but the members felt that the remedy would not be met in passing the motion of Aids, Turkington and Stroud, and thus voted in favor of having the matter go to the finance committee.

The question brought forth a good deal of discussion, which at times was quite lively.

The motion of Aids, Turkington and Stroud was to have the assessment roll for 1913, given one insertion in each of the city newspapers.

Ald. Turkington stated that he had looked into the matter and found that the roll could be published at the rate of 2 1/2¢ per line. He felt that the expenditure would be warranted. The workingman had asked for it and he thought their wishes should be met.

Ald. Harrison felt that the wishes of the people should be met but he did not feel that the publication in the newspapers would bring about the desired results. He pointed out that in 1885 the roll had been published and that no good had been derived from it. He felt that ten per cent of an increase could be raised from a revision of the assessment roll and that perhaps it might go as high as fifteen per cent.

Continuing, Ald. Harrison stated that next year a commission of three assessors might be appointed, two additional assessors to act with the present assessor. This commission would satisfy the people, he thought, and as a result of their finding there would be few appeals.

Ald. Ross stated that the question of the assessment roll was being discussed in almost every city. He would not favor publishing the roll in any abbreviated form so that a fair assessment was being made. Some plan should be set on foot for this purpose, and for this reason he advocated referring the matter to the finance committee, believing that Ald. Turkington's motion would not fit the bill.

Ald. Rigney was of the same opinion as Ald. Ross. The plan of Ald. Turkington would not bring the desired results. The whole question of the revision of the assessment roll should be given over to the finance committee for a report. He pointed out that city officials might enter appeals which would bring results.

Ald. Shaw said that while at first he had favored the publishing of the roll, he did not feel that the expenditure as proposed would be warranted. He favored the idea of having three assessors do the work.

Ald. Kent favored the plan of Ald. Ross and Ald. Rigney. The assessment roll could be seen at the city hall at any rate and complaints made if it were desired.

Ald. Stroud wanted the list published. After it was printed then action could be taken.

Ald. Ross said that if the list was published this year it would have to be corrected next year, and it would not be a good policy.

Mayor Hoag questioned the publishing of the list. He wanted the council to find the remedy for the existing evil, if there was an evil.

Ald. Turkington said he would press his motion. He was backed up by a large number of workingmen, and he felt that their wish should be complied with.

Aids, Ross and Rigney then moved to have the matter referred to the finance committee and this motion was passed. Aids, Turkington and Stroud alone voted for the publication of the list.

Ald. Turkington was quite warm when his motion was voted down and made a remark to the effect that the workingmen were unable to get fair treatment at the hands of the council.

"It looks as if the workingmen will have to take the pill and swallow it," said Ald. Turkington.

"I object to that statement," said Ald. Ross, "and would ask that Ald. Turkington take it back." He stated further that he was quite in sympathy with the movement to have the assessment roll revised and he did not think it was right for a member of the council to make such a remark.
