WHAT IS COMING.

Will Make Eggs And Other Foods From Air. Chicago, Sept. 25.—Dr. Paul Walden, of Riga, Russia, predicted here last night that the next great feat of chemistry will be the making of eggs from air. Dr. Walden, who is president-elect of the Ninth International Congress of Applied Chemistry to be held in St. Petersburg in 1915, further predicted that a variety of nutritious foods will be made from the air some day.

"I consider it practically certain that at no distant date we will be drawing food supplies from the air," he said. "Prof. Berthsen, of Germany, has already succeeded in making the simple compound nitrogen and hydrogen. This shows that we will be able to make more complex compounds. An egg is a complex compound of nitrogen, oxygen, sulphur, and hydrogen. The chemical process of the hen will be imitated in the laboratory and undertaken. Formerly we were able to do very little with the uncombined nitrogen in the atmosphere. Now that we are able to harness it the possibilities are wonderful."

SPAIN VERY BACKWARD. What a Report, ordered by King Alfonso Shows.
