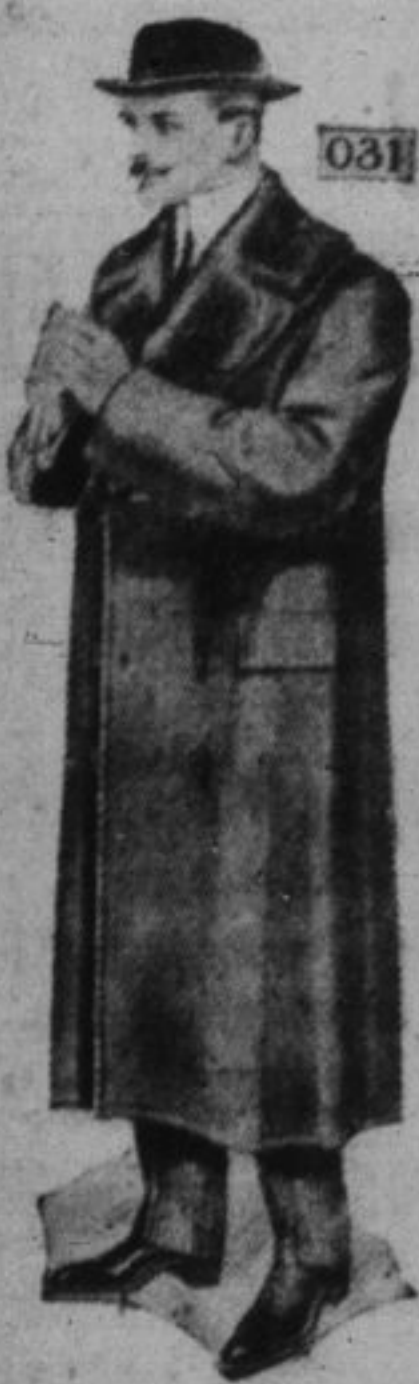

THE FUR HOUSE

NOT WELL QUALIFIED

FOR THEIR WORK IN THE MILITARY CAMPS.

What Col. Benson Says? About the Non-Commissioned Officers—How to Meet This Deficiency.

In his review of the training season of 1911, Colonel T. Benson, officer commanding the third divisional area, calls for a higher standard of efficiency among the regimental officers and the non-commissioned officers who attend the camps of instruction. In his report, just issued, Colonel Benson goes so far as to say that scarcely a non-commissioned officer arrives in camp thoroughly qualified for the rank he holds. This is quite a strong statement, but it is obvious to all who are in the best interests of the militia of Canada, and are in a position to know. The conditions which the officers commanding units are "up against" in this respect are scarcely unavoidable, and in most cases are generally understood. The rural corps are the greatest sufferers in this respect. If the N.C.O. during the few days of camp, is able to qualify himself and pass the required examination, it is apparent that his services are lost to his regiment, during that time. To meet this it has been proposed to institute a number of instructional classes throughout the winter months, to last one month, five nights a week. These classes will be whenever and wherever it is possible to collect a few officers and N.C.O.'s together for an hour's drill or instruction in the evenings, under capable instructors. The primary object of these classes is to produce an efficient body of officers and N.C.O.'s in the regiment. Though no examination will be held at the finish of the course, the instruction will be of great value to those wishing to qualify for certificates at the Royal School of Infantry, and enable them to pass certain portions of their subaltern's course without difficulty upon their arrival at Stanley barracks, Toronto. The officers commanding units are urged to give this matter their urgent attention, which will possibly rectify a long-existing state of affairs.

TENDERS RECEIVED

For Construction of Ottawa-Kingston Electric Railway.

J. S. R. McAnn has just returned from a meeting of the directors of the Ottawa, Rideau Lakes and Kingston Electric Railway company. Tenders were received for the construction of the line from Ottawa to Smith's Falls, Smith's Falls to Kingston, Lombardy Junction to Perth and Lanark. Contractors' tender in detail for each of these divisions will be forwarded at once to London, England. A resolution was passed instructing Mr. Upson, the manager, to go to England upon call from the English syndicate. A resolution of condolence was presented, referring to the death of Edward Kidd, M.P., former vice-president.

A tender for the construction of the three divisions was \$25,000 less than Mr. Upson's estimate, which will undoubtedly be considered a favorable point by the English capitalists. Canadian interests are approaching this company to enter that town.

Thomas McAuley's Birthday.

Thomas McAuley, the veteran book-seller, was seventy-five years old on Friday. He is a native of county Meath, Ireland, but came to Canada when nine years of age. He first located in Toronto. Then he went to Hamilton. In 1859 he came to Kingston fully equipped as a book-binder. Here he started in business in 1860 for himself, and has ever since been in the bookbinding and book-selling business. Those who do not know Mr. McAuley will find him every day at his store on Princess street. The town couldn't do without him, and the Whig hopes that he will live to be at least one hundred years of age.
