In the city council chamber, this evening, a public meeting will be held, to discuss the advisability of forming an agricultural society, with a view to holding a fair every fall. Mayor Hoag has called the meeting, believing that it is a question' which should be discussed and decided upon, without delay, and His Worship hopes that there will be a large turn-out of citizens, at this meeting.

The civic property committee had the question of repairs to the buildings at the fair grounds, under discussion, at a meeting, on Wednesday afternoon. The buildings have received little or no attention for some years, and for this reason, it will require quite a sum to put them in shape again. A rough estimate of the amount required to repair the buildings, and put the race track in good condition, has been placed at \$5,000.




