



Tips For the Farmer

BY UNCLE JOHN.

Flooded Potatoes.

In respect to flooded potatoes, experience has shown that if the water is got away quickly, provided the tubers are not under water for more than thirty hours, they rarely suffer directly by flooding; also that when water stands for more than ten days there is little chance of potatoes keeping sound. Drowned potatoes do not come from potato disease, but through the eyes being blinded to want of air causing them to decay. The tubers are covered with a appearance of a sleepy pup. If they do not go to sleep in a few days there is good reason to assume that they will remain sound, for decomposition is very rapid. In very wet years, especially a stiff land, which becomes water logged though not actually flooded there is often a great loss, though it is more commonly attributed to many instances in which early observation showed a large number of tubers, but at digging-time few are found, and there is no trace of them.

Items of Interest.

Owing to the almost continuous rains that have fallen throughout the months of July and August, the British bay crop has been seriously damaged, and in many parts completely ruined.

Consequently, it is expected that there will be considerable shortage in supplies, necessitating large imports. Inquiries have already reached the Bristol trade office, and Canadian exporters will probably find a good market there this season.

Canada is now an exporter of dairy cattle to New Zealand. Recently a shipment of eighteen Holsteins from Canadian herds was taken out via Vancouver. Most of the cattle came from Ontario, but a few were from Fort Hammond, B.C. Freight charges from Vancouver to Auckland amounted to \$75 per head.

Several importers of dairy cattle intend to arrange for shipments in the future, and the Canadian trade commissioner asks for a list of exporters who raise high-class dairy cattle, as he believes that business will result.

In 1910 only ninety-six cattle were imported into New Zealand. The duty is 10s per head.

The Dairy Bull.

A great many farmers who buy a registered dairy bull make the serious mistake of trying to buy a cheap pure-bred scrub rather than a strong foundation animal on which to build the future herd.

The only thing they look for is the fact that the bull is registered and is offered at a low price. But if ever a man needs a first-class animal, it is when he is starting. Most men start out with the idea that they can buy such an animal for \$50 to \$100. But if one was offered them for \$200 that had come through a long, careful line of wise breeding, they would refuse to consider it. Right here is where they make their mistake. When men start to look for a bull price is the last thing to think of. So many farmers look at this important subject wrong and foremost.

Poultry Farming.

A writer in the "Farmer and Stockbreeder" has the following to say regarding the starting of poultry farming in the autumn:

There are some people who have an idea that the spring months are by far the best time to start poultry farming. They imagine that during warm weather a greater degree of success can be achieved with consequently less risks to face. I think, however, those who make a start in September or October with reasonable care may come out very well in the end. Before a start can be made, even in a small way, the site will have to be selected very carefully. It is foolish to start keeping fowls on an piece of land, which happens to be vacant, regardless of its position, or whether the drainage is satisfactory or not. There are some places which in themselves induce large egg supplies, while others, no matter how well the fowls are fed and housed, will never give as good results as they should do.

The purchase of poultry houses is something which should always receive great consideration. Flimsily-

made structures may do for shelter places, but will not last long if exposed on bleak, hillsides. Some appliances makers now list half-made buildings, but in order to create big safe many flimsy-made houses are offered at tempting prices.

The poultry keeper should start clear of poor buildings. If wire net pens have to be erected, practically the same state of affairs has to be faced.

Cheap fencing is seldom durable, though frequently purchased, cannot be recommended.

Two inches mesh is quite large as may be safely used. Even this does not last longer than three years, but very seldom.

The greatest enemy to poultry keepers during winter is disease. Perhaps a run may egg one season, but next year several of the birds will contract severe colds, possibly some of them may turn to diphtheric roup, which is very contagious, and will result in great damage unless speedly checked.

Still, the beginner in poultry keeping should really find a certain amount of pleasure even in dealing with diseased birds, because each day he is obtaining knowledge which will probably prevent him from disasters at some future time.

I have known some of these pullets which have laid wonderfully well during the cold winter months.

Even when they have been exposed to all the winds that blow, they have faced the elements bravely, and certainly proved very profitable.

Eggs can be obtained in winter in moderate quantities there is sure to be profit. It is a long time since anyone heard of eggs being a glut on the market during these months.

Each year the demand for eggs grows greater, while prices, too, seem to be rising.

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I have known some poultry keepers who thought that buying genuine pullets was too expensive during autumn months, but those who commence with yearling hens will be very fortunate if they have any profit to show at the year end. To get a big supply of winter eggs we must have pullets, and it was at all possible cheaply to replace all year-old hens with young birds, no doubt.
