#### COAL SCHOONERS IN GALE OFF OSWEGO.

Cleared for Kingston on Sunday, and Had to Turn Back—First Consignment of New Grain Has Arrived—Movements of Vessels In and Out of Port.

Several schooners, loaded with coal, stayed out on Sunday from Oswego, but were compelled to turn back on account of the rough weather. The steamer Sowards and the schooners Andrews, Merrill and Maltz were among the number. The steamer Samuel Marshall was in port on Sunday on her way to Montreal, with coal, from Sandusky. The steamship John Randall was in port on her way from Oswego to Ribou points with coal. M.T. Co.'s elevator, the tug Barton and Selkirk, with grain from Port Colborne, and towed the barge Kingston over to Oswego to load coal for Montreal; tug Thomson, from Montreal, with three light barges and cleared for Montreal with three grain barges.

The steamer Kinnmount, which discharged grain at the Montreal Transportation company's elevator, had the first consignment of new grain from the west. Just half of her cargo was new grain. In a few days now a great deal of new grain will be coming down the lakes. The steamer Rosedale, grain-laden, from Fort William, is due to arrive at Richardson's elevator to discharge on Tuesday.

The steamer Byron Whittaker, loaded with corn from Chicago, is expected at the Montreal Transportation Co.'s elevator, to discharge. The steamer Rhodes and the steamer Glenellah were in port on Sunday on their way west. The tug dredge Macdonald, No. 5, was in port, towed by three tugs, on her way to Trenton.

The steamer Simla is due up tonight from Quebec, on her way to Port Colborne, to load grain. The steamship Jaska is at Swift's with coal, from Oswego. The steamer Toronto was down to Prescott and up on her last trip of the season on Sunday. She will lay up in Toronto. When leaving Swift's wharf at five o'clock the whistle on the big steamer blew several long blasts as a "Fare ye well."

The steamer City of Ottawa went west on Sunday. The steamer Rideau King cleared for Ottawa on Monday. Dredge Was Raised. The Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking company succeeded, on Saturday, in raising and pumping out the Laurent & Leitch's dredge No. 4, sunk in the Beauharnois canal, in twenty-one feet of water.
