SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

Has Been Planned by the Superintendents' Union.

On Monday evening, in the Y.W.C.A. parlors, the Sunday School Superintendents' Union of the city held a meeting, at which it was decided to hold two rallies of Sunday school workers, one in November and the other in January. A tea will be given in connection with each, four of the schools being responsible for each, and after tea, local Sunday school difficulties, of teaching problems, etc., will be discussed. There will be ten or more delegates going from Kingston to the convention in Hamilton. This convention will have over seven hundred delegates, the largest Sunday school convention ever held in Canada, and special interest will attach to the reports or echoes. On the first Sunday in the New Year it is proposed to have a great rally of all the schools belonging to the union.

The customs revenue returns at the port of Kingston for the month of September amounted to \$28,386.81; for September, 1911, \$17,349.87; increase, \$11,036.94. The total revenue for the fiscal half year amounted to \$187,274.47. For 1909-9.418 collections amounted to \$172,496.12; 1909-10, \$194,908.09; 1910-11, \$250,215.78.

BUILDING IN KINGSTON

So Far This Year Amounts to Sum of \$410,470.

Up to October 1st, the amount of building permits taken out at the city engineer's office has been \$410,470, as compared with \$230,086 during the same nine months of 1911. During September the permits amounted to \$32,085.

There are several large works to be added to the first named amount before the year closes. Thirty working men's cottages are to be erected. The work at the artillery barracks has not yet been reported, although begun, the power house is to be started this week, and quite a lot of other work has to be added, so that the total building operations of the year should reach \$550,000.

ROWLAND COTTAGE

Is the Gift of R. W. Leonard to Hospital Governors.

Recently R. W. Leonard, chairman of the Transcontinental Railway Commission, was in the city, and, in company with Dr. J. C. Connell, made a visit to the Sir Oliver Mowat memorial hospital. He was so pleased with his visit that he has forwarded to Dr. Connell a cheque for \$800, to be devoted to the erection of a cottage on the grounds, and to be known as the "Rowland Cottage," in memory of his wife's family. The gift is one that is highly regarded by the Board of Governors.

Two Convicts Transferred.

Two persons were brought to the penitentiary on Tuesday, being transferred from the Dorchester penitentiary. One was an Italian and the other was of French nationality. They were taken to the Portmouth prison owing to their minds being affected, and will be confined in the insane ward.

Officers from the Dorchester prison brought the convicts to the city on the noon train, in their prison garb, shackled and handcuffed. The son of sunny Italy was sentenced to "do" twenty-five years for manslaughter, and his brother convict is serving a term of ten years.
