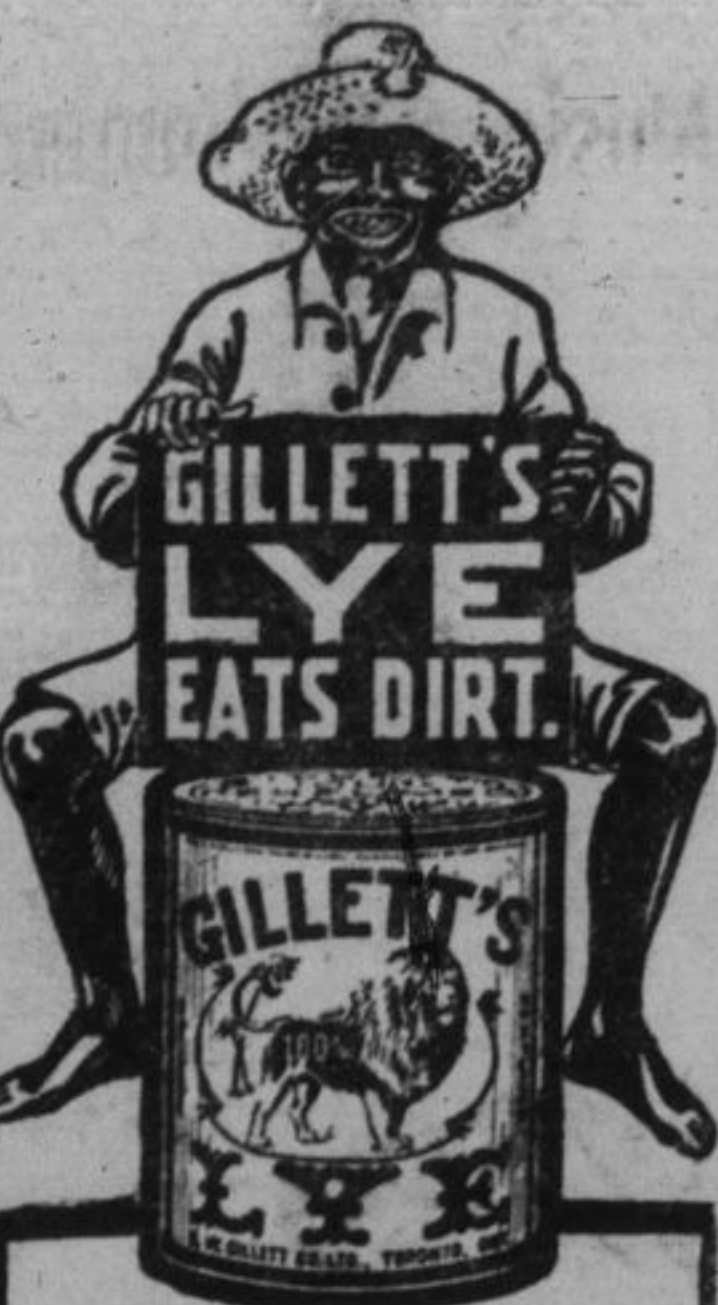

THE CITY IS IN NEED

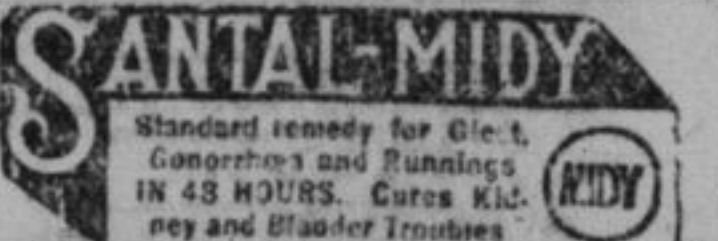
Of Open Churches Every Day of the Week.

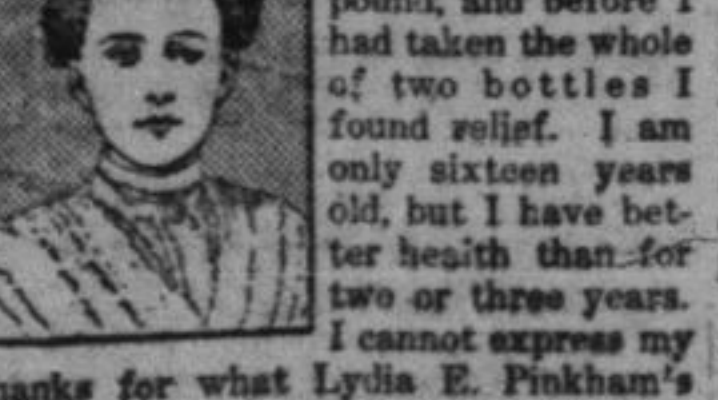

A QUEEN'S MAN'S SUCCESS.

R. A. MacLean Secures Degree of Ph.D. at Chicago.

At the recent convention of the University of Chicago, R. A. MacLean, who for the last three years has been lecturer in classics at Manitoba college, was awarded the degree of doctor of philosophy, cum laude. Dr. MacLean has had a distinguished academic career. He was graduated from Queen's university, Kingston, in 1903, with honors in classics, and after serving for a year as tutor and assistant in Latin, he accepted a fellowship in Greek in the University of Chicago, where he has pursued his post-graduate studies. Three years ago he was appointed lecturer in classics at Manitoba college.

In addition to his interest in academic work, Dr. MacLean has been an extensive traveller, and during the last year has been particularly interested in archaeological work. He joined the bureau of university travel in Boston, and along with a party of archaeologists, went to Greece and visited the chief centres of interest there. The party went to Crete and saw the excavation work which is being conducted there under the supervision of Sir Arthur Evans.

Dr. MacLean has resigned his position in Manitoba college. He has been elected a director of the bureau of university travel for Canada and has been invited to lecture abroad on the subject of Greek literature. He expects to return to Greece early next year. He formerly lived in Smith's Falls.

Died at Brewer's Mills.

Brewer's Mills, Sept. 28.—On the evening of Sept. 23rd death claimed Mrs. Joseph Hellyer, only daughter of the late W. H. Nelson, Barrfield, Dec. 25th, at one o'clock, followed by a lengthy cortege, which testified to the esteem in which the deceased and the remaining members of the family are held. After the funeral service which was conducted by Rev. Mr. Smith, Lyndhurst, the procession went its way to Gananoque cemetery, where the remains were placed in the vault. Besides her sorrowing husband she leaves two sons, Herbert W., of Brewer's Mills, and Edward C., Gananoque, and one daughter, Miss Eva, at home.
