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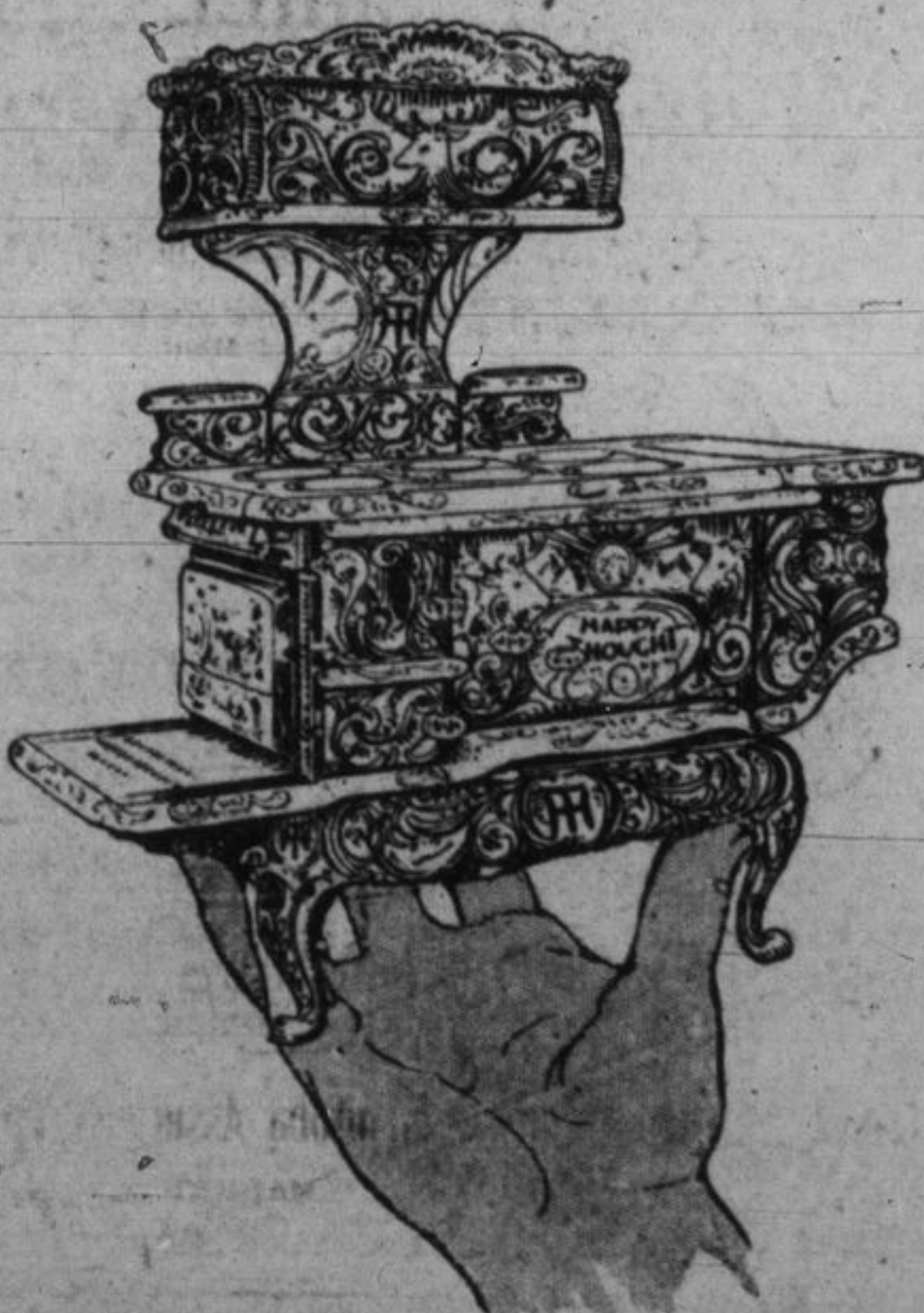
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THE SPORT REVIEW

QUEEN'S MAY HAVE NO RUGBY STARS THIS FALL.

No Further New Material Has Yet Appeared—Father Stanton Confident of Defeating Queen's Next Saturday.

There was no new material on the campus on Monday when the Queen's players turned out over thirty strong to drill for their coming fight with Ottawa. The runners which continue to crop up about Leckie and Elliott are to be in the game are groundless. Queen's expected a good man from Mount Allison College but he has not come, and it is thought that he has been induced to remain at home. The old material of Queen's, however, is breaking in well, and some of the men who last year were at it for the first time are showing up well. There is no doubt that Queen's, although perhaps not booked to draw the championship, will at least give a few surprises in intercollegiate rugby this year.

Queen's Track Sports.

Little has been done at Queen's as yet with regard to the track sports. The track men are not all here yet. There are three runners out, but the track is not in good condition. There has been nothing doing in tennis lately as the tennis court has been too wet. Some drilling for the fall sports has been going on in the "gym" and the first few days of dry weather will see the track and tennis men out.

Notes About Rugby.

The average of the Ottawa College team is slightly under twenty years and the average weight 159 1/2 pounds. Ottawa Citizen: Goodwin, the ex-Queen's player has all the earmarks of a great centre half. He appears cool and fast and is likely to prove a sensation. If he gets off to a good start.

Hamilton Tigers will not have Hume, the former Yale player, as coach. Hume knows little or nothing of the Canadian game and a few minutes with the Tigers served to show that fact. Geo. Ballard will coach the back field and Hugh Murray the wings. In the belief that "beef" will count heavily in American football under this year's revision of the rules, the coaches are doing their utmost to develop heavy men. Any promising candidate who tips the scales at 150 pounds or heavier is sure of getting plenty of attention. Canadian football teams are discarding the laced canvas jacket for the leather-padded sweater in vogue across the line. The sweater is lighter and tends to speed. The jacket prevents free breathing.

Father Stanton is sanguine of victory over Queen's when the latter plays at the Ottawa College grounds next Saturday. He will have a stronger team than the one he put against Hamilton Tigers on Saturday. Hayes, Peterson and O'Leary will be on the fourteen.

Ottawa Journal.—The fact that McGill, the Tigers and the Ottawas have American coaches, while Ottawa's Father Stanton also hails from across the boundary, may mean that the two countries will be playing the same game ere many seasons. Not that these men will change our rules. The new coaches will adapt our game to a great many of their plays. They may make it faster, more scientific and more pleasing to our Yankee cousins so that, when they grow tired of continually changing their own rules, they may adopt the Canadian game as it will be when that time comes.

THE LATE MRS. COKEFAIR.

She Passed Away in Brooklyn Last Week.

The Cokefair home, Brooklyn, N.Y., at No. 506 Eighth street, was plunged into deepest grief through the death, Wednesday, and burial, on Friday, of Mrs. Maissa Knapp Cokefair, who, in Kingston, Ont., is related to the numerous Knapp families.

The deceased, a native of Kingston, Ont., was sixty-nine years old and a resident of Brooklyn for over forty years. About fourteen months ago she commenced to complain of illness; recently she took to bed. Despite the best medical attendance, surrounded by many of the members of the family whom she recognized to the end, she passed away Wednesday, death coming to her, according to one of the relatives of the family, "like a shadow passing over a flower."

The funeral service was held at her late residence on Thursday night, and was largely attended by her relatives and friends. The attendance was such as to have caused the room in which the service was held and the sympathy expressed for the family. The floral tributes of the family and friends were many and completely filled the parlor bay window, where the casket rested in the front parlor, and one side of the room as well. The casket was in a plain casket that was so smothered with flowers that the remains could hardly be seen.

Rev. Dr. Pomplpy officiated. He paid a glowing tribute to the memory of the deceased, in which he spoke of her as a woman who loved others and as one who was loved in return. At the conclusion of the services all present took advantage of the opportunity to view the remains.

Accompanied by only the relatives of the family, the body was taken, on Friday, to Mount Hope cemetery, where it was laid to rest beside the body of Mrs. Cokefair's late husband, William N. Cokefair, whom she lost about ten years ago.

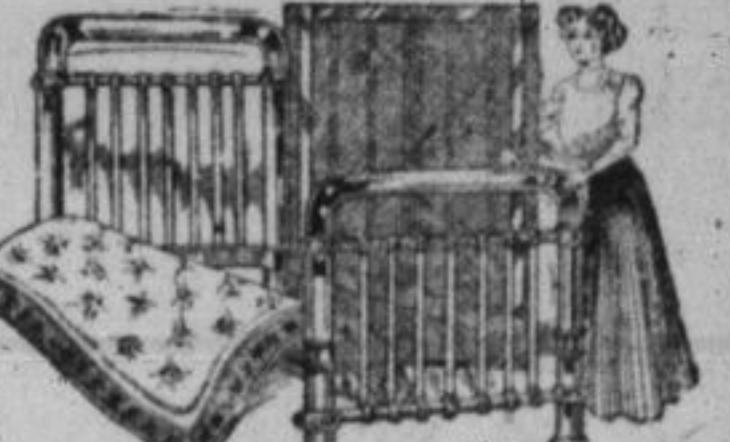
