THE CALL OF LAURIER

FOR A CANADIAN NAVY BUILT IN CANADA.

The Liberal Chief Minister, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, addressed a large and enthusiastic audience...

Cornwall, Oct. 1. In clear-cut, ringing tones Sir Wilfrid Laurier last night delivered his message on the naval problem...

"At the present time," said he, "there are some men in Toronto, and in Winnipeg - well-disposed men in both parties, liberal and conservative - who have signed a memorial, a copy of which they have sent to me, asking the leader of the government to consult with the leader of the Opposition, my humble self, with a view of making the naval policy unanimous..."

"By nationalists I have been told I was a traitor to my race," continued Sir Wilfrid; "by imperialists I have been told I was a separatist. Let us as liberals be above all such narrow notions of nation and prejudice. Let us not take advantage of the existing situation to excite passions or prejudices. We wait for the policy of the government, and will judge it on its merits - on its merits, I repeat. We will support it if it is right, and oppose it if it is wrong, but the judgment shall be given upon merit, and not upon passion or prejudice."

"In the meantime - and while we continue to wait, and wait - (laughter) - we stand where we have stood right along. Our policy is a Canadian navy, built in Canada, equipped in Canada, manned in Canada, under the control of the Canadian parliament and the Canadian people, and ready if Britain should ever be on trial - to do its part, a worthy part, as a loyal daughter of the old motherland." (Prolonged applause.)

QUEEN'S AT OTTAWA.

Dr. F. Etherington Will Likely be Referee. Queen's has suggested Dr. F. Etherington for referee of its match at the capital with Ottawa College next Saturday, and the Ottawas have agreed to him, providing that an Ottawa man is appointed as umpire.
